Good Price for Cheese.
The price of cheese on the Frontenac Board Thursday was 15 1-8 cents a pound, and the expectation of those looking for a rise was not realized. The price, however, comparatively speaking, is still considered a good price by the farmers, who expected that sooner or later there would be a return to normal after the "riot" that took place during the war. It was not conceivable that the high prices reached could remain, and the prudent ones were able to see it. Before the war, cheese never reached 15 cents so that the industry is still enjoying a margin of profit that is regarded as quite satisfactory. It was the development of the dairy industry in Eastern Ontario that brought improvement in agriculture here, and enabled the farmers to lift long-standing mortgages. This began about twenty-five years ago, and Canadian cheese has secured a firm hold on the European market.
