## GEN. BURSTALL'S PRAISE INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

For the Kingston P.W.O.R.—  
He Writes the Commanding Officer.

The following letter has been received from Lieut.-Gen. Sir H. E. Burstall, K.C.B., K.C.M.G., A.D., the Inspector General of Canadian Forces, by the officer commanding the P.W.O.R. Sir Henry writes regarding the parade of the local infantry unit with the R.M.C. cadets and the troops of the garrison last Sunday morning:

"This is a line to congratulate you on your turn-out of yesterday. I thoroughly appreciate the rather more than ordinary difficulties that are being met in carrying out the work of re-organization. When I saw your battalion yesterday, I was quite confident that the Princess of Wales' Own Regiment will carry on all the traditions of the old 21st Battalion, and of the fine old Princess of Wales' Own Rifles, which your battalion now represents.

"I hope it will be possible for me to see you again later in the summer when your work of re-organization will be completed. I feel that the City of Kingston will always have every reason to be justly proud of its representative battalion.

FIRE CHIEF JAMES ARMSTRONG, Fire Chief Armstrong has been fighting fires for twenty-four years, and in the words of the street, is still "going strong."
