Cinders Come High. The village of Iroquois last year purchased several carloads of cinders from the Grand Trunk for use on its roads. The bill has just been passed by the village council and amounted to \$851.

Enroute to Mexico. Prof. C. W. Greenland, who has been teaching Columbia University during the winter, has left for San Francisco and will continue the journey to Mexico where he will be engaged in geological research.

A petition is put in circulation in Belleville calling upon the council to defer action in the matter of passing the by-law to issue \$140,000 of debentures for Coleman ward school. Quite a number of citizens have signed the document contending that the time is inopportune.

Died at Bowmanville. There was laid to rest on May 19th

an aged and respected citizen of Bowmanville in the person of Margaret Wilson, beloved wife of Mr. William M. Horsey, police magistrate. Mrs. Horsey had been a citizen of Bowmanville for sixty-two years. She was an aunt of E. E. Horsey, of this city.

Changed Its Name. At the last meeting of the Village Improvement Society, of Clayton, N.Y., it was voted to change the name of the society to "The Women's Civic Club." Meetings will be held twice a month, on Thursday evenings. The club has offered to take charge of the flowers for Memorial day.

New Fishing Law. A new law has been passed in New York state under which it will be illegal to take from the St. Lawrence river pickerel fifteen inches long, with the limit at fifteen. Previously the law allowed the taking of pickerel not less than twenty inches, and the limit was twelve instead of fifteen.

Married on the Stage. Miss N. E. Bush, a general favorite in Frankford, Ont., was married on the stage at Greenville, N. C., where she was playing with the Bert Vogler Musical Company. Lyle Choppin, a member of the company, was groom, and Judge Winkler performed the ceremony. The bride is a sister of Mrs. Arthur R. Whitelaw (nee Ethel B. Bush), Frankford.

Will Be The Leader. In July at Couchiching, under the auspices of the Provincial Religious Education Council, departmental training will be given in Sunday school work. Prof. John F. McFadyen, Queen's College, will be the leader. He will train the normal class each day and these in turn will lead the school. Prof. McFadyen is also to lead a separate group for the

ministers who are present covering the "Parabolic Teaching of Jesus."

Married at Cape Vincent, N.Y. On May 19th at the Methodist Episcopal parsonage, Cape Vincent, N.Y., occurred the marriage of Miss Gladys Mae Consul, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Consul, Cape Vincent, to John Milne Riddler, Clayton. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. E. Pratt, the ring service being used. The young couple will make their home at Clayton.

Formed a Company. Belleville Motors Limited, now applying for a charter, have taken over the agency of the Ford car for the district and have leased the plant of Greenleaf's Limited, Mill street. The partners of the new firm are Earl F. Chapman, son of the late Arthur Chapman, county clerk, and Eardley Wilmot, both Belleville boys, who are returning from Toronto and Detroit.

Frankford's Assessment. According to the first assessment of the incorporated village of Frankford just completed by the assessors, W. J. Gallagher and W. W. Pettit, the total assessment of the village is \$306,235. The value of buildings is \$50,800. The value of land is \$227,840. The value of a fund is \$27,585. Total acreage of the village is 601. The total population, as found by the assessors, is 719.

Attended Two Funerals. Mrs. Mirza Nichols and daughter, Miss Jennie Nichols, Toledo, Ont., are spending a few days with relatives in Brockville. What very rarely falls to the lot of any one person, Mrs. Nichols went directly from the funeral of her husband to Brockville to attend the funeral on Sunday of her brother, Richard Stratton, a former well known and popular resident of Toledo.

New Grist Mill. William Bengry, formerly manager of the Interprovincial Mills, Renfrew, is talking of starting a mill to do grinding and chopping for the farmers in that vicinity. At present there is no mill in Renfrew at which farmers can get their own grain converted into flour for their own use. The mill, it is understood, will have a capacity of 50 barrels of flour a day.

Ill Luck Pursued Him. Ill-luck appears to be pursuing William Boyle, Cedar Grove. Last fall his wife died of injuries received in a runaway accident. Late in April his barn was struck by lightning and totally destroyed, with very small insurance being held, and on Wednesday, while returning from the cheese factory, Mr. Boyle was thrown from his wagon and had his collarbone and three ribs broken.

In Charge of Survey. Douglas Wright, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Wright, London, has received his appointment as head of the geological survey, and leaves at once with his party for the far north. Mr. Wright, who served three years' overseas, returned after the war to Queen's University, of which he is a recent graduate. With his young wife, also a Queen's graduate, Mr. Wright was a guest with his parents in London.

Moderated in a Call. At the meeting of the Lanark and Renfrew Presbytery at Carleton Place, Rev. M. Henry, interim moderator for Adamston, reported that he had moderated in a call to Rev. A. J. McMullen, B.A., Manotick, Ont., in the Presbytery of Ottawa. The call was signed by 151 members and 108 adherents. The stipend promised is \$1,500, payable half-yearly in advance, with \$100 for moving expenses, and free use of manse, and holidays.

Farmers Complain. "Kingston restaurants do not reflect the shrinkage that has taken place in the prices of essential articles of food." This was the complaint of several farmers on Thursday, who stated that whereas they were obliged to accept lowered prices for their butter, eggs, pork and potatoes they were called upon to pay war prices at the restaurants when they went to dinner. "We were given the smallest helping, too," said a lady, "and it is surely time that a reduction was made in some of the prices at the restaurants. We have paid to-day the same prices charged last year and the year before, just as if potatoes were still \$3 a bag and butter 60 cents a pound and pork 40 cents."

The Customs Collectorship. The Renfrew Mercury understands that there is a movement on foot, backed by several local organizations, to have Miss Mabel Wright appointed to the position made vacant by the death of her father, the late Orange Wright. Miss Wright is well fitted for the position. She is a graduate of Queen's University and has had eleven years' experience as her father's assistant. During the years when there has been a changing tariff to deal with. There are no details of the business with which she is not perfectly familiar. In all her work she has given uniform satisfaction. We understand that the appointment of Miss Wright would meet with the approval of a very large majority of the people of Renfrew.
