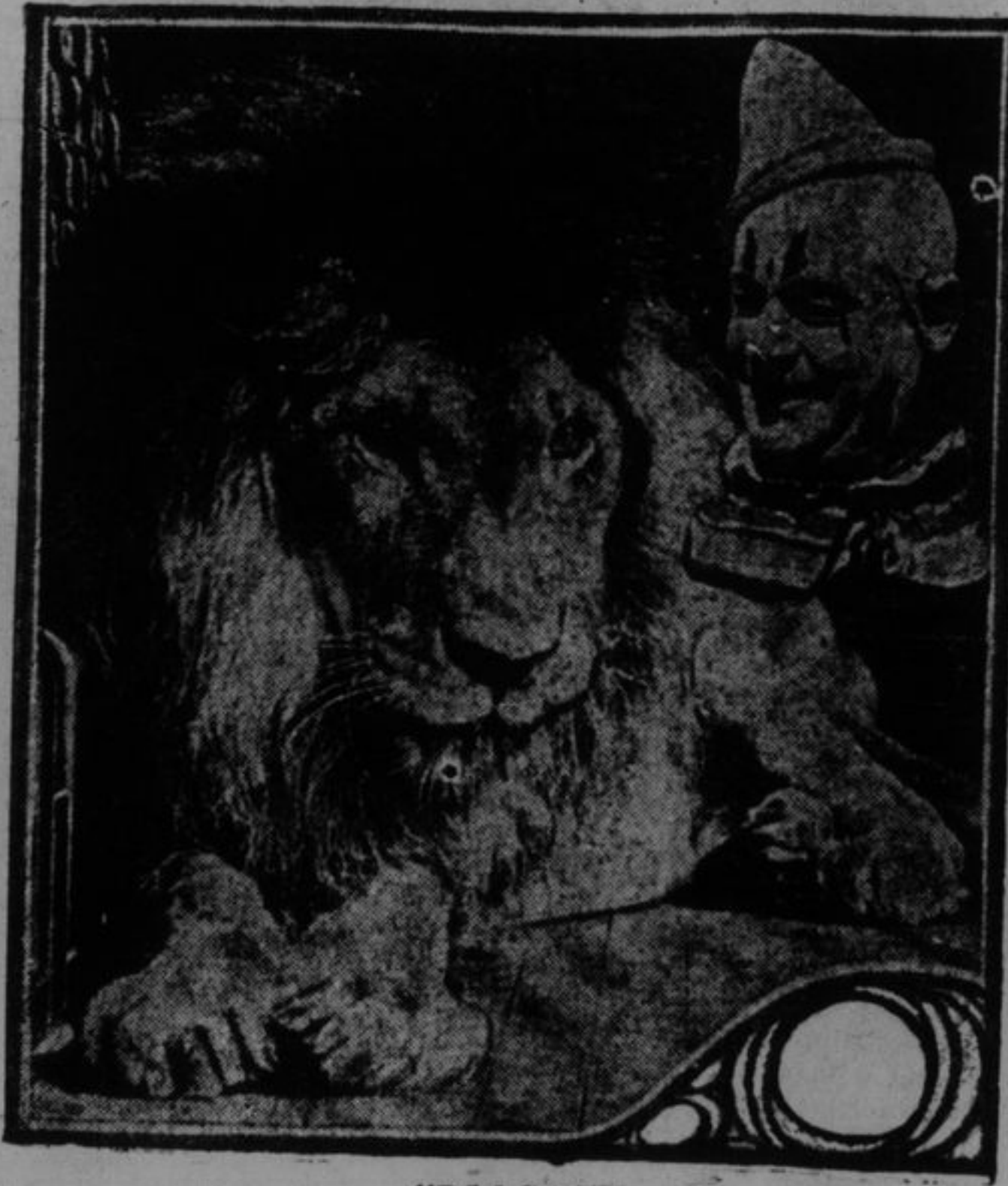

THE HOME MISSION AND SOCIAL SERVICE WORK

Of the Presbyterian Church is Very Extensive in Canada.

Toronto, June 2.—The department of Home Missions and Social Service of the Presbyterian church in Canada is one of the most important in that denomination in the scope and diversity of the work undertaken. The report of the year's work as presented to the General Assembly, now in session, is a revelation of the many-sided nature of the programme. Reduced to statistics, the church maintains a thousand home mission centres in the dominion, 369 being augmented charges, where the local contributions are supplemented by grants from the church funds; and 699 other home mission stations are found in every province, and extending from the extreme east of Cape Breton and the boundary line between Quebec and Labrador to the far-flung western areas of the Peace River country and the Yukon. Presbyterians are strong believers in home mission work, and the seed-sowing of its pioneer "sky pilots," such as John Black, James Robertson and others, is bearing rich fruit. A small army of home missionaries; 325 in number, have been recently appointed to student fields for the coming summer.

The church has a sympathetic attitude towards the New Canadian and the non-Anglo-Saxon, and has forty-seven special missions for their benefit alone. These serve a wide range of races and nationalities, not only in the chief cities but among the foreign communities, both urban and rural, in the west.

This outline of Presbyterian service does not, however, cover all. The report shows thirty-three educational centres, including school homes in Quebec and the western provinces, which provide home influences for hundreds of youths, mostly of foreign birth; who attend public or high school in the locality. Specially promising are the Ukrainian boys and girls who are thus being served.

The Presbyterian hospital work is one of its choicest expressions of Christian service, there being twelve Christian centres, in which thousands of patients are annually treated. Most of these hospitals and the auxiliary hospital units are found in the outlying parts of the western country, long distances, in some cases, from medical or hospital help. In this and similar work, the Women's Missionary Society render most effective service.

The Presbyterian Social Service programme is likewise an important and helpful one, including five Settlement Houses, in Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver, in which a wide range of activities is carried on for the benefit of hundreds of families and thousands of members, many of whom are of foreign birth.

There are also seven redemptive homes in various centres, which annually touch the lives of hundreds of needy girls with results that are most encouraging. Regard is also had for the immigrant, through the Department of the Stranger, in which the Women's Missionary Society also co-operates. Nearly 20,000 individ-

ual immigrants were ministered to through this department during 1920.

COL. J. W. ALLISON LOSES IN ACTION FOR \$300,000

Unsuccessful in His Suit Against Remington Small Arms Company

Ottawa, June 2.—Col. John Wesley Allison, famous here during the war in connection with the investigation of war contracts by the Meredith-Duff commission, was unsuccessful recently in an action brought by him against the Remington Small Arms Company for \$300,000 commission which he claimed on orders he is supposed to have secured for the company from the British government. The case was heard during May in the supreme court of the state of New Jersey.

The facts date back to the days when Sir Sam Hughes was minister of militia and Col. Allison was a prominent figure in munitions. Mr. Allison held honorary rank as colonel in the Canadian army. He backed his claim to the \$300,000 commission on the contention that large orders secured by the Remington Small Arms Company were the result of his influence with Sir Sam Hughes and thus with the British government.

The courts dismissed the action on the grounds that the contract, if any, between the company and Col. Allison was not such as could be enforced by a court of law. It was a question of public policy. At the trial it was not proven that Sir Sam Hughes had anything to do with the whole affair. The Remington Small Arms Company put forward the claim that the munitions contracts were secured in a perfectly regular way from its agent in England.

Much of the evidence produced in the New Jersey court was forwarded from Ottawa. Lengthy reports of the one-time world-famed enquiry conducted by the Meredith-Duff commission into the relations between Sir Sam Hughes and Mr. Allison used and also correspondence with Sir Robert Borden, then Prime Minister, in connection with the retirement of Sir Sam as Minister of Militia.

It is understood here that Col. Allison will appeal the case.

TOUCHED BY SPERIOUS HEIRESS

Winnipeg, June 2.—A career, in which, it is alleged by the police, leading Winnipeg banks, hotels and department stores were victimized, was brought to an abrupt close today when Mabel Howard, twenty-five years old, of Sioux City, Ia., was arraigned in court on several charges of passing worthless checks.

She was granted a remand in order to secure counsel, but was not allowed bail.

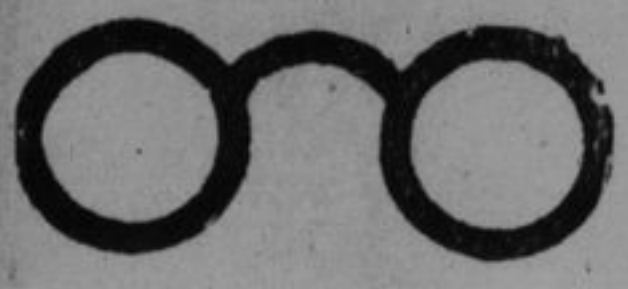
