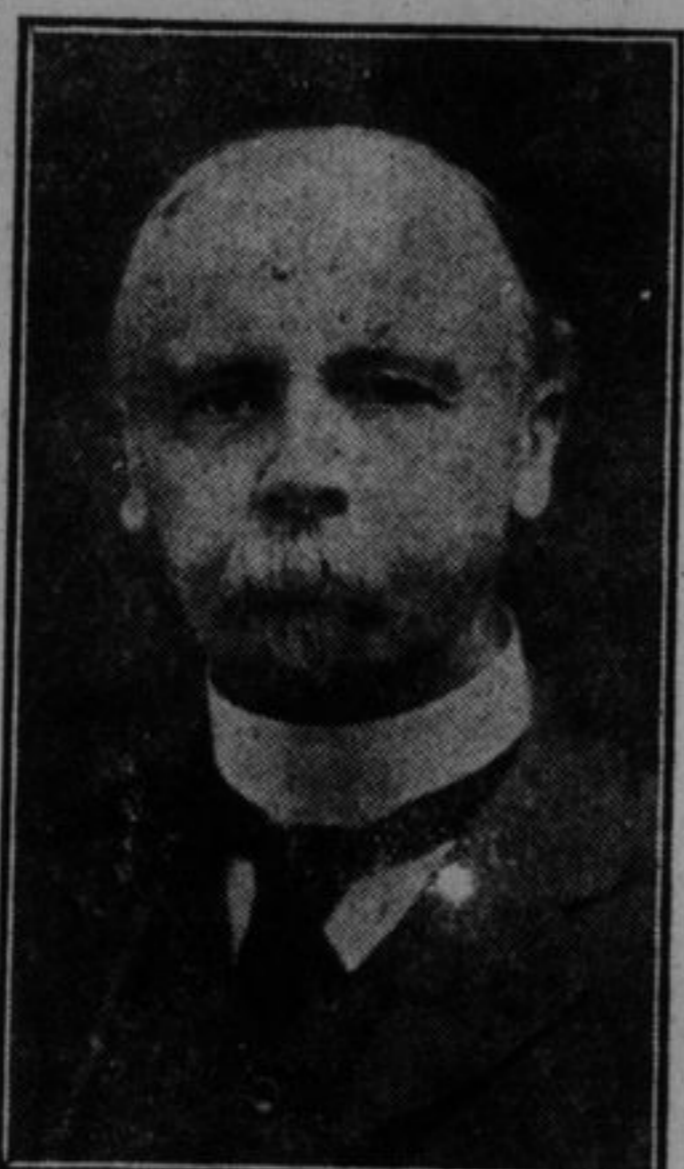

THE LATE B. W. ROBERTSON

Well-Known Kingston Wholesale Grocer Passes Away After Long Illness.

Benjamin W. Robertson, head of the wholesale grocery house of George Robertson and Sons, died at his residence on Earl street at 11.25 o'clock Thursday morning, after an illness extending over five years. The deceased was one of Kingston's best citizens, and was especially known for the deep interest he took in religious matters. Mr. Robertson was the founder of Bethel and Calvary Congregational churches, which have done such good work in Kingston.

Mr. Robertson was the son of the late George Robertson, and was born at Kirkwall, Orkney Islands, on the 31st December, 1843. The family came to Canada about 1858 and settled in Kingston, where they prospered. The Robertson wholesale grocery house was established in 1867, and is one of the best known in Ontario.

The deceased is survived by his widow; two sons, Aldermen Herbert H. Robertson, who conducted his father's business of late; George, St. Catharines, and one daughter, Mrs. D. J. Walker, Toronto. The funeral is to take place to Catarauqui cemetery on Saturday afternoon, and Rev. A. F. Brown, Calvary church, is to officiate.

QUITS AS PASTOR

Resigns After Fight in the General Assembly.

Elkton, Md., June 2.—Dr. JOHN McElmoyle, the famous "marring parson," who has made many couples from New York and other cities who wanted quick weddings happy, has finally given up the fight against the move to oust him from his pastorate by submitting his resignation to the Elkton Presbyterian church.

Dr. McElmoyle takes a fling at the general assembly, and his church backs him up by presenting him a purse of \$2,000 and the privilege of the parsonage as long as he chooses to occupy it.

The resignation followed the action of the Presbyterian general assembly at Winona Lake, Ind., in sustaining the order of the Presbytery dissolving the pastoral relations between Dr. McElmoyle and the Elkton church.
