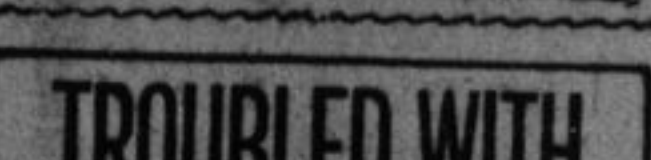

## PROVINCE PROFITS BUT NOT CONSUMER

License Board Made Ten-strike by Taking Liquor Out of Bond.

Toronto, June 4.—In profit, \$300,000 to \$400,000 will find its way into the provincial treasury this year as a result of a good stroke of business pulled off recently by the Ontario Board of License Commissioners—a sort of parting gift from the chairman, J. D. Flavell, who has severed his connection with the government. It is understood that some time before the new tax was put on liquor by the finance minister's budget, the license board had a tremendous amount of purchase liquor in bond. In the ordinary course of business this liquor would be brought out of bond only as it was required. The chairman, with the coming budget and the probability of a further levy on liquors in mind, took up with his colleagues the advisability of taking out all liquor in bond. The government was also consulted and the large amount of money required to put the plan through was provided. The budget, of course, put a heavy additional levy on liquor and had the province been forced to pay it on the stock of liquor so recently in bond it would have been nearly \$400,000 out of pocket. The government might have decided to let the purchasers of liquors from the dispensaries get the benefit of a stroke of business foresight, but the provincial treasury is hungry these days and as a result the \$1 increase per bottle in the price of "wet goods" went on when the jump in excise came along to justify it, even though the dispensary liquor escaped it.

## SENDS TWO FIFTIES TO CROWN ATTORNEY

Letter Addressed Slightly Wrong; Sentence is Suspended.

Cobourg, June 4.—Benjamin Hopps, of Seymour township came up in the county court here before Judge Ward, charged with an attempt to interfere corruptly with the administration by sending a letter through the Campbellford postoffice, containing two \$50 bills, addressed to "John Kerr, Crown Attorney, Cobourg," and which was received from the Cobourg postoffice in the mail of W. F. Kerr, the present county crown attorney.

The object, it was presumed was that the crown attorney might be influenced to be as lenient as possible with his only son, against whom an assault charge had been preferred.

Mr. Hopps, it is stated, acted upon the advice of a friend in sending the letter. He was found guilty, but allowed to go on suspended sentence. The \$100 was deposited to the hospital.

## SOLDIERS' INSURANCE.

All Returned Men Will Be Eligible Under Amendment.

Ottawa, June 4.—The house of commons passed a resolution providing for amendments to the Returned Soldiers' Insurance Act, as suggested by the special committee on pensions, insurance and re-establishment. The resolution provides, among other things, for deleting the words, "domiciled and resident in Canada" from the act.

The effect of this will be to make all returned soldiers, whether domiciled in Canada or not, eligible for insurance. Another amendment provides that payments of insurance shall not exceed \$1,000 on the death of the insured, and the remainder, if any, or the portion thereof to which any beneficiary is entitled, shall, at the option of the insured, be payable as an annuity.

Another amendment grants to the insured the power of designating by declaration who will receive the benefit of his insurance, should he die unmarried or a widower without children.

## OROP CONDITIONS REPORTED GOOD

Manitoba Farmers Optimistic and Expect Banner Crop This Year.

Winnipeg, June 4.—With all conditions pointing to a banner crop, Manitoba farmers are generally optimistic regarding the yield this year, according to a report issued by the provincial agriculture department today. The acreage, the report states, is about normal. No actual harm has as yet been done by grasshoppers, but they are hatching generously in some places. The country, however, is well organized to cope with any situation which may arise from this pest.

Although seeding commenced late in some parts of Manitoba, the progress during May has been quite satisfactory. The large amount of ploughing done last fall enabled rapid progress to be made with seeding of barley, though in some sections this has not all been sown as yet.

## Saskatchewan Hopeful.

Regina, Sask., June 4.—Reporting perfect crop conditions in many districts, sufficient rain everywhere and some light frost damage at some points, statements received yesterday by the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company from representatives of towns all over the province show seeding of grains to be nearly completed.

A feature of the report is the small amount of flax seeding reported. This, according to the authorities, is due to the low market quotations and the possibility that there will be recovery of flax prices before the fall.

The statements give no information of grasshoppers.

## Crops Fine in Alberta.

Calgary, June 4.—Crop reports from all over Alberta say conditions have never been better since 1913 and are 50 per cent. better than last year. Wheat and oats are up four inches in many places and there is practically no frost damage. Everything is ten days to two weeks earlier than in 1920.

## Passed Bogus Cheques.

Belleville, Ont., June 4.—A cheque artist operating in this vicinity, visited this city with the result that three persons engaged in the grocery business were victimized. The man gave his name as ex-Sapper D. A. Molray, and presented cheques on the bank of Montreal stamped militia and defence and signed by Capt. Crawford. In each case Molray made a slight purchase, receiving the change. All the cheques were for \$19.75. That the cheques were bogus was not discovered until next morning.
