BOATHOUSE WAYS DISPUTED IN SUIT

Alexandria Bay Men Principals in Case—Plaintiff Claims Isolation.

Whether or not the plaintiff is granted a temporary injunction restraining the defendant from using the ways between his boathouse and that of the plaintiff at Alexandria Bay pending the action brought by Charles White against Clarence S. Thompson to compel him to remove both boathouse and ways, will be determined by Justice Claude B. Alverston after a review of the papers in the case presented in special term today by attorneys John T. Delaney with Judge John Conboy as counsel for the plaintiff, and A. R. DeYoung of the firm of Whitte & DeYoung for the defendant.

The plaintiff alleges that the use of these ways and the tying up of boats nearby by the defendant cuts the plaintiff off from the use of his boathouse. The land upon which the two boathouses stand was formerly a marsh and has been filled in and built up. Deeds carrying the title back to the time the property was owned by Depau and tracing the ownership of the defendant's property down through the parents of Captain Thompson, were represented by Attorney DeYoung, who claims that he is operating within his rights. This contention is disputed by the plaintiff.
