Speaking of the small churches in rural districts, Mr. Elliott said that they furnished most of the candidates for the ministry and not the city churches. As an illustration he cited the experience of the First Baptist church in Kingston which furnished but one candidate for the ministry in fifty years, and that candidate was himself. There must be an active response on the part of the stronger churches for the support of the smaller ones. We must have more men, money and work.

**Home Missions.**  
Rev. J. E. Chute, missionary from India, gave a most interesting address on "Foreign Missions," and in opening he said that the impressions received by the returned missionary on reaching the homeland were very discouraging. He was appalled to see some of the conditions that had invaded the church life. "If our young people are not going to be Christians what are we going to do in the future?" he asked. He learned that in one church of six hundred members there were but two baptisms in a year. We are strong in the foreign missions only when we are strong in the Canadian home churches. The Forward Movement will be of no real value if the spirit be not in the hearts of the people themselves.

India has been properly called the brightest jewel in the British crown. He paid a high tribute to the great work achieved by the British government for the advancement of the people. If the British were not there the people never would have awakened to the desire for self-government. The British government and the missionaries have done the work.
