On every hand are to be seen repulsive proofs of a despicable hankering after the unclean.
But the maiden lady who puts pantalettes on her piano legs is not the type to set the standard.
In the minds of some people morality is supposed to depend upon clothes. When these persons themselves take a bath or prepare to retire at night all that they have which they hold to be modest or moral they hang on hooks or throw over chairs.
According to these persons' strange views of what constitutes morality and modesty, God made a wicked and vulgar blunder when He created Adam and Eve naked, and He persists in that blunder in permitting people to continue to be born naked into the world in this immodest and immoral state.

They are happy, even in their darkness, for they have found a new usefulness, thanks to the opening of this industrial department a little over two years ago.

Macdonald Park Improvements
Visitors to Macdonald park have noted the improvements that have been made this year to the beach in front of the George Richardson memorial bathing house. Last year sand was dumped along the shore to cover the rough stone, but this spring it was found that the action of the waves had washed it some distance down the shore. Another attempt is now being made to give a smooth bottom by paving it with sandbags filled with gravel, sand, and cement. The bags are being placed as closely as possible and the crevices filled in with cement. This will give a smooth surface and will be just as good as flat rock. The work will be continued for a distance of some thirty feet from the shore. A cement step has also been constructed at the water's edge, thus making landing very easy. It is proposed to construct an L-shaped pier on the west side of the house, but this work will not likely be started until the fall. The citizens of Kingston are certainly indebted to those who are giving them good bathing facilities.
