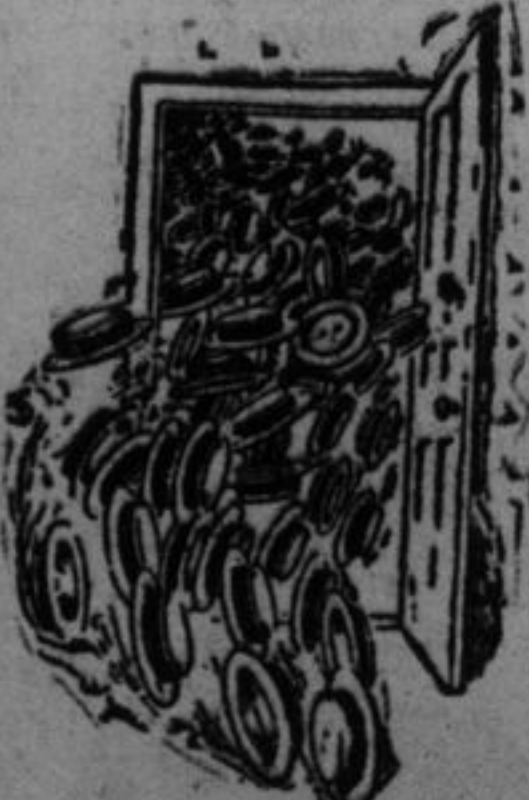

LETTER FROM KING COMES WITH PLAQUE Will Be Distributed to Next of Kin of Those Who Died.

The bronze plaque which is being sent by the Imperial Government to the next of kin of all Empire soldiers who died in the late war has reached Ottawa, some 30,000 of these having been received by the department of records, Ottawa. These will be distributed as soon as the new medal room in the Daily Building, now in course of construction, is completed. There will be in the neighborhood of 60,000 of these distributed in Canada. With them goes a letter from His Majesty worded as follows: "I join with my grateful people in sending you this memorial of a brave life given for others in the great war."

The letter is dated Buckingham Palace. With it is a scroll reading: "He whom this scroll commemorates was numbered among those, who, at the call of King and country, left all that was dear to them, endured hardship, faced danger, and finally passed out of the sight of men by the path of duty and self-sacrifice, giving up their own lives that others might live in freedom. Let those who come after see to it that his name be not forgotten." The plaque is in bronze and is about six inches in diameter. It contains the inscription: "He died for freedom and honor," and the name, number and rank of the dead soldier. The plaque contains Britannia in relief with the Hon. trident and fish. Unlike the Canadian memorial cross, which goes only to the mother or widow of the dead soldier, this goes to the next of kin and cannot be left in a will to others.
