KERMESS IS SPECTACULAR SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNICS

Prives a Great Social Event—Well Attended at the Armouries.

The Kermess, the most spectacular and in many ways the best amateur performance seen at any Kingston stage in later years, with a cast of five hundred townspeople, was the great social event of the week. Beautiful stunts and costumes, graceful dancing and marching, with admirably arranged lights, were noticeable features of this fine performance, presented on behalf of the military hospital patients, at the armouries. Among the specialists, Miss Mary Derry, a charming young songstress, received a big bouquet of roses and a box of sweets on Thursday evening, and Miss Evelyn Ford, Minneapolis, who is a guest at "Alwington," won great applause and a bouquet by her dancing as "The Sunbeam of the Gypsy Camp." Mrs. Eric Phillips and Miss Mary Gratton quickly won their audience, the former's graceful Spanish dance being much admired, and the latter proving herself a splendid duchess. Perhaps the most charming dance was that of Lt.-Col. D. Douglas Young and Miss Nora Macnee, whose graceful green draperies floated lightly as her slender form swayed to the music. Two beautiful bouquets and the hearty admiration of the audience went to her and her partner, Miss Phyllis Devlin, always a favorite, was a delightful Carmen, and the big sheaf of roses, given her over the footlights, caught so deftly by her "Torreador," (P. L. Lynwood) was an expression of the admiration of the audience. Queen Titania (Miss Mildred Mahood) and King Oberon (Master Willie Laird) were "perfect dears," the spectators said of these tiny actors. Miss Frances Devlin, the accompanist, came in for many complimentary comments for her excellent work.

The grand pyramid march and crowning of the Kermess King and Queen, was a truly lovely spectacle. Regal and full of grace, Miss Katie Moore, wearing a magnificent robe of white and silver, a blue feather fan providing the artistic note of color, was indeed every inch a queen, and it was with an unerring instinct, that Col. Hill presented her with the key of the hearts of the people of Kingston. Her consort, the king, Lt.-Col. D. D. Young, made an imposing figure in his uniform.
