

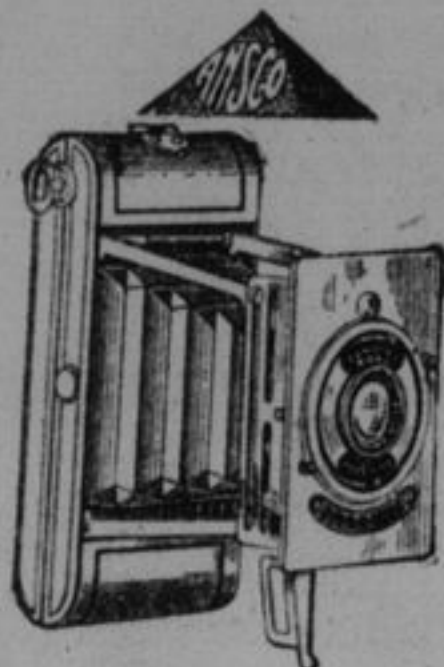

Ponies Twice Deteat St. Mary's, of Toronto

The Ponies defeated St. Mary's, Toronto, Thursday evening by a score of 6 to 4 in what proved to be an intensely interesting game. The Ponies had a run of luck in the second inning, chalking up four runs, and it looked like a cinch when Cherry, Twigg, W. Evans and J. Evans trooped home. Here St. Mary's got down to business. Here St. Mary's made the better of the play. McFarland made the first run in the fifth. He was followed in the sixth by Spanton and Morris when Gallagher had bad luck and five reached the bases, Smith being struck by the ball and McFarland getting his base on balls. In the seventh Kelly scored, making four runs. Stewart and Daly scored in the fifth for the Ponies, but in the sixth, seventh and eighth St. Mary's held them down.

There were no sensational features. The batteries were not quite evenly matched as Gallagher had the advantage over Kelly, but the fielding of both teams left nothing to be desired. Saunders manifested a tendency toward the spectacular and paid for it by allowing Morris to make home safely in the sixth when the visitors had their only chance of winning. Smith ran bases for Spanton and got home. When he came to the bat he was struck and walked to first. He reached third and was followed to second by McFarland who was walked. He was making home on Grady's hit to the short stop when McFarland was put out running to third. Daly made a fine catch of a full in the eighth.

The sun was so hot that hundreds of fans had to seek the shelter of the trees of the park, and the terrace north of the diamond was practically deserted. But despite the intense heat the players of both teams put up a great game and the Ponies had to extend themselves to secure a margin of one run. This came in the seventh inning when Cherry featured the batting by a home run, after Thompson, Evans and Daly had trooped home one after the other. Thereafter, Derry had simply to shut the batters off and he did it.

Unlike the first game, St. Mary's got away with the lead, scoring four runs in the second inning against one by Daly, and this gave the Ponies a conundrum to solve and the interest of the spectators increased in consequence. In the third inning Williams scored for St. Mary's and Saunders and Cherry scored for the Ponies. In the fourth, fifth and sixth neither scored, but in the seventh the Ponies were able to bunch their luck with four runs against one by McFarland.

The fielding generally of both teams left nothing to be desired. Williams short stop for the visitors did some very pretty work and so did Arnie. The batting of the home team was superior, the principal sluggers being J. Evans, Daly, Saunders, Cherry and Twigg, while Grady, Spanton, Morris and G. Thompson represented the visitors.

English Horse Won Grand Prix 13th Time

The Grand Prix de Paris was won Sunday by J. Watson's chestnut colt, Lemonora. Flechour was second and Harpocrate third. The purse was valued at 400,000 francs, the largest stake ever put on a French race course. The winner ran third in the Epsom Derby this year.

Lemonora came up on the outside after all the French horses had tired and won easily by two lengths. Seventeen horses started in the race. The victory of Lemonora was the third time in succession that an English horse won the Grand Prix de Paris.
