Members Offer as Special Constables—Oppose Dr. Clark on Pensions Board.

CADET CAMP NOT LARGE

The Brockville Corps is Well Represented—The Daily Routine.

The high school cadet camp opened at Barriefield on Monday under Lt-Col. G. H. Gillespie, inspector of cadet services, M.D. No. 3. All of the high schools in the vicinity of Kingston that could raise a squad did so, and all except the contingent from Smith's Falls, reported in on Monday. While there is some disappointment as to the number, Lt-Col. Gillespie is pleased over the response especially from Brockville. The Kingston K. C. I. and the high schools are not fully represented.

The boys went right under canvas and everything was in readiness in the way of the necessary equipment and supplies. Marshal Reid, commander, is in charge of the food supply. The camp routine is as follows:

Reveille, 6 a.m.; prayers, 6.45; breakfast, 7; fatigues, 7.45 to 8.15; sick parade, 8; physical training, 8.30 to 9; squad drill with and without arms, 9.15 to 10; platoon drill, 10.15 to 11; company and battalion drill, range practice (details by musketry instructor), 11.15 to 12 noon; dinner, 12.15 p.m.; organized sports, 1.30 to 3.30; swimming parade, 4; supper, 5.30; retreat, tattoo, 9.30; last post, 10; lights out, 10.15.


The total number on the roll Tuesday morning was 260. The number expected was 400.

The high schools represented at the cadet camp are: Brockville, Renfrew, Iroquois, Athens, Prescott, Gananoque, Perth and Kingston.

Lt-Col. Gillespie is not satisfied with the response and in order to overcome the situation another year he proposes to call the collegiate cadet corps to camp in the month of June, immediately after the closing and the examinations. This will give him the boys who associate and prefer to be together. In July he will hold a separate camp for the high schools. July is really too late for the older boys, who plan ahead for their holiday work, and are off as soon as possible after the closing and are not disposed to throw up their work in July for camp.

George Young, secretary of the Military "Y," is providing recreation and entertainment for the lads. All day they were active in setting up their tents, and in the evening played ball.
