Carpentier is Talking Of His Lost Chances

Georges Carpentier has been accused by the courts of using poor judgment in his fight with Jack Dempsey.

Instead of attempting to outsize the world's champion, it was generally supposed that the Frenchman would use his feet to keep away from Dempsey.

Carpentier admits that he did make a mistake but that he could not help it.

"I thought I was strong enough to hold him in the clinches. Once in the first round I did get an upper cut over in a clinch, but that ended it," the Frenchman said. Georges explained that he had trained for close fighting with Joe Jeanette and Paul Journee.

"They are great big fellows and I thought they were about as strong as the champion," he said. "I had no trouble in holding their arms in the clinches, but Dempsey just knocked my arms down and hit me at will."

Carpentier further explains that he didn't keep away from Dempsey because he couldn't.

"In the third round I changed my tactics and tried to outstep the champion but I couldn't do it. He is much faster than we had thought. He kept on me all the time. Twice in the third round I danced away from him, but the third time he caught me against the ropes and rocked me with one of his great left-hand punches," he said.

Descamps and Gus Wilson were supposed to have directed his fight from the corner. Carpentier denies this with the emphatic statement—"I always fight my own fights."

The Frenchman, however, admits that the "board" in his corner, after the first round, told him that he was using the wrong methods against the champion and that he should stay away from him.

"I knew it, but it did me no good," he said. "I found out in the second round that I could not drop the champion and I realized that if Dempsey was to be beaten he would have to beat himself. Some of our friends told us that Dempsey burnt himself out in a few rounds and that if I stayed away from him for five or six rounds I would win. I tried to do that after the second round but he was too fast for me."

If the batter hit a ball on fair ground and, while on his way to first, run into the ball, he would be out if the ball touched him on fair ground.

American Prize Fight Shock to German Mind

The Independent Socialist journal Freiheit of Berlin in an editorial on the Dempsey-Carpentier battle says: "Can you conceive of anything more ghastly and horrible than the more ghastly and horrible than the individuals who can only zoologically be regarded as members of the human race, beating each other until one is unconscious?"

"Instead of the thousands of spectators blushing and hanging their heads in shame, they cheered the loathsome spectacle.

"Boxing is lower and more degrading in its coarse brutality than the combats of the old Roman gladiators. It is baser than the despicable cruelty of the Spanish bull fight. What really triumphs is the power of money.

"This pest of interest threatens to destroy our culture. It is especially dangerous to the working classes. It is the object of Socialism to replace this brutalizing of the spirit and eradication of muscles by high ideals of humanity."

CARPENTIER MIGHT HAVE WON WITH 4 OUNCE GLOVES

Before leaving on the Adriatic Eugene Corri, the British referee, voiced the opinion that Carpentier would have knocked out Dempsey if the boxers had used four-ounce instead of eight-ounce gloves. "It was a wonderful bout," said Corri. "It was perfectly refereed. Carpentier would have won if it was another man than Dempsey. The Frenchman is still one of the world's greatest ring generals. He knows all anyone will ever know about boxing."
