FOUND DEAD ON SHORE.

The Late Alexander McCormac, an Amherst Island Farmer.

Stella, July 11.—The island at present is badly in need of rain. The hay crop, which is being harvested now, is a very light one, and much of the grain will be short. Some barley has already been cut. The milk supply at the Stella cheese factory is rapidly decreasing owing to the dried up pastures.

Death came with startling suddenness on Thursday morning to a young farmer of the island in the person of Alexander McCormac, aged thirty-eight years. The late Mr. McCormac had not been in the best of health for some time past, but had been doing his work about the farm. The excessive heat is supposed to have hastened the end. He drew his own milk to the dairy that morning, and on going home told his wife that he felt unwell and that he would go down to the bay shore, which is some distance from the house and bathe his feet. His wife on going to look for him a short time after, discovered him lying in the water face down. Help was hastily summoned, but life was found to be extinct. The deceased is survived by his wife and one son, Robert. He was a member of Derry Lodge, No. 2, P.A.P.B. and of Court Stella, No. 653, C.O.F. The funeral was held on Friday at 2 p.m. from his late residence to Glenwood cemetery and was conducted by Rev. W. McCree.

E. A. Scott met with a serious accident recently. While unloading some rough straw from the wagon in the field, he slipped and caught his leg on a bolt attached to the box. He was severely torn. Dr. H. S. Northmore was summoned. And it required twelve stitches to sew up the injury. He is reported to be doing nicely.

A Dangerous Pavement.
