Lace is one of the most prominent trimmings of the summer frock. It is used with conspicuous success for the filmy wrap as well as the formal gown. Sometimes it appears in its natural color, or it may be dyed to match the fabric with which it is combined. It is frequently employed to adorn the smart hat and some of the most interesting decorations are achieved by the use of yardage laces.

At the left is pictured a fascinating summer wrap, which is admirably suited to wear with the evening frock. It is made of printed georgette and Chantilly lace. The fish-like collar is edged with the lace, which also appears about the lower part of the wrap. The sleeves, set into deep armholes, fall gracefully about the arms. They are finished with the lace.

This wrap is drawn about the figure and caught at one side with a single button. The colors shown on the white georgettes are tangerine and green, which are most effective.

To the right is an all-lace gown. It is draped over a foundation of flesh-colored satin which enhances the beauty of the cream lace. The skirt is designed with an apron tunic back and front, while the V-cut bodice has straps of rhinestones on the shoulders.

The waist is encircled with a grosgrain ribbon bright green in color. A lace cape is thrown about the shoulders. The transparent wrap is considered excellent for midsummer, and is exceedingly modish.

places as well as the market places of countless thousands.

In the capital of Persia, for instance, there are said to be twenty-five miles of narrow arched passages. These wind and twist through the city. They are flanked by small shops. Most of them are mere alcoves set in the walls for little retail merchants. At intervals you see archways open in the walls. In these you catch glimpses of caravansaries. These are merely large courtyards into which file camels come from far places, to squat at command and be relieved of their burdens of goods of all kinds. Into the warehouses set in the walls these goods are taken to be brought forth again when the retailer comes to stock his tiny shop.

Up and down these narrow passages walk the crowds of gayly dressed people. Sometimes horsemen, donkeys, camels, carriages come along preceded by cries of warning, at which there is a mad effort of pedestrians to get out of the way. The noise is nearly deafening to ears unaccustomed to it, but the natives calmly chatter to each other and bargain with the tradesmen loudly and at great length.

Through these mobs walk men with tiny popcorn wagons and vendors of peanuts. Rose-flavored ice cream is to be had, hot boiled potatoes or large slices of sugar beet. And if any one wishes a real meal he does not go into a restaurant. If he is poor, he walks until he comes upon a vendor of mutton and bread. With their charcoal braziers set in the street these outdoor restaurateurs do a thriving business.

### Why Is a Curly Head?
