"Wedding Bells" — "Sham" — A Story of Venice — An All-Woman Play — "Beyond Price" — Wanted To Be a Bull Fighter.

CHE fun in "Wedding Bells" starts when Constance Talmadge as Rosalie Wayne, a society girl with absolutely no regard for convention falls in love with Reginald Carter (Harrison Ford), who happens to be stopping at the same Palm Beach hotel. Their introduction is brought about by Rosalie's poodle, the dog taking one of Reggie's patent leather pumps from its position outside Reggie's door and running into Rosalie's room with it.

Reggie admires Rosalie's beautiful hair, and his admiration for this leads to love. Marriage follows, and for two days the newlyweds are very happy, until Reggie unthinkingly admires the bobbed hair of a girl sitting nearby. Rosalie is immediately offended and leaves the dining room. The next time he sees her, her hair is bobbed. And the next time she sees him, he has the measles but doesn't know it. They don't meet again for a whole year.

The foregoing takes place at Palm Beach; but the rest of the story takes New York City for its locale and deals with the efforts of Rosalie and Reginald to effect a reconciliation.

and much of the action takes place in the theatre. Matheson Lang, the great English actor, plays the part of "Silvio Steno," a famous Italian player, around whom the action in the story pivots.

In the story, "Silvio" goes on the stage as "Othello." To him the part seems exaggerated for he thinks the Moor should never have condemned his wife on such flimsy evidence. Then he finds himself face to face with a similar situation in his own life.

As his own tragedy unfolds, he finds that he must play on the stage the immortal tragedy of the Moor, with his own wife in the role of "Desdemona." To enact a tragedy before an audience, which he is really living in his own person proves too great a strain upon the artist. The outraged but mistaken husband triumphs and the mimic tragedy comes near to becoming a real one before the horrified audience. How the situation straightens out forms the dramatic conclusion.

"Beyond Price"

"Beyond Price" is the story of a girl married to a man who gives nearly all his time to business. The wife is naturally of a fun-loving nature, and three of staying alone at home. One day after her husband has left on a trip—foregoing an engagement to take his wife of the theatre—a gypsy woman

Crops Are Seriously Affected For Lack of Rain.

Athens, July 12.—Parker Richards, Frankville, and Levi Scott are now in charge of the garage, corner of Hemm and Wellington streets. Mr. and Mrs. Richards have leased a flat in the Parish block. Mrs. Clara Chant, Boston, has purchased William Allingham's Princess street property. Most of the local merchants have agreed to close their places of business at 12.30 p.m., Wednesdays, during July and August. This vicinity seems to have escaped the occasional showers which fell in various districts and as a result crops are seriously affected. A welcome shower of brief duration fell on the 11th inst., so all are in hopes that the spell of drought is broken and that more showers will follow.

Raspberries, in limited quantities have appeared, the earliest bringing 30c a box. Blue-berries, which promised to be so abundant, have been blighted and only a few palls have been marketed. They bring from two to five dollars per-pail. Milk had been reduced from 10c to 8c for about a month, but the dry weather has

caused a return to the old price.

WAPTA LAKE CAMP

About eight miles west of Lake Louise Station on the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway just before entering the Kicking Horse Canyon, the traveller notices a very beautiful sheet of water named Wapta Lake, sheltered from the north by a high and massive mountain capped by eternal snow.

On the shores of this lake, facing a magnificent Alpine panorama, a rustic bungalow Camp has been constructed, which opened for visitors on July 1st, and will provide a comfortable and convenient centre for those who desire to explore one of the most romantic and picturesque districts in the Canadian Pacific Rockies. The Lake itself is at an elevation of 5,190 feet above sea level, and faces peaks scaling up to over 11,000 feet. It is only half a day's walk from Lake O'Hara, which has been selected as the site of the Annual Camp of the Alpine Club of Canada for 1921. Lake O'Hara, however, is more than a centre for Alpine climbers. It was selected by John S. Sargent, the famous artist, as one of the most beautiful places he could find in the Rockies, surrounded as it is with mountains of wild and rugged grandeur which at the same time compose into pictures of unending beauty.

Wapta Lake is actually in British Columbia just over the Great Divide, which will undoubtedly be a favorite trip from the Camp. Ten minutes walk to the west of the Camp the Kicking Horse Canyon begins, down which one can walk, ride or drive. From the west end of Wapta Lake to Field is less than twelve miles, while the distance to Yoho Falls in the Yoho Valley is ten miles, and to Emerald Lake is fourteen miles. Towards the north, one can reach Sherbrooke and Ross Lakes in about an hour and a half, so that the variety of excursions offered to those who stay at this Camp is remarkable.

Wapta Lake Camp is constructed on the same lines as the Lake Windermere Camp, which proved so popular last summer. It has a Central Community House for dancing and recreation purposes 30 feet square with a wide gallery round the sides. The kitchen is a large building, 20 x 26 ft, while the cottages are of varying sizes and design—double cottages being 24 x 14 ft, and single cottages 14 x 12 ft. Each cottage is equipped with a small heater and stove pipe on account of the cool nights natural to this elevation. The Camp is within the jurisdiction of the Dominion Parks Authorities, and subject to the Dominion Parks regulations, which are particularly in guarding against forest fires, preventing the cutting down of green timber in the vicinity of the Camp and forbidding any dealing in liquor on the premises. The Camp occupies an area of three acres, and the rustic bungalow character of the cabins gives it a very attractive appearance.

About 50 visitors can be accommodated at one time. Two bath houses, one for men and one for ladies, are supplied with hot and cold running water and toilet facilities.

Hector is the Station for Wapta Lake Camp and for the convenience of visitors a motor launch will connect with a landing stage in front of the Camp. Transfer charge from station to Camp is 25 cents each way. Saddle horses and guides will be available for those who wish to ride, and telephone connection with Chateau Lake Louise will make it easy to communicate with those who have engaged any of the Company's Swiss Guides. These guides are in great demand, and their services should be requisitioned well in advance.

One of the most thrilling trips in the whole Canadian Pacific Rockies can be made from Wapta Lake Camp. This is by way of Lake Louise over the Victoria Glacier to Abbott Pass under the great precipices of Lefroy. After the summit of this Pass one reaches Lake Oesa, from which one gets an exquisite view of Lake O'Hara down below. From Lake O'Hara an easy trail down Cataract Creek brings one back to Wapta Lake. This, of course, is a somewhat strenuous trip, and requires Swiss Guides.

An easier trip on saddle ponies through magnificent Alpine scenery is through the Yoho Valley to Emerald Lake or over the Burgess Pass to Field. A four-in-hand Tally-ho will drive down the Kicking Horse Pass on a road which follows the old C. P. R. grade.

The rates for Wapta Lake Camp are very moderate, being \$5.50 per day for those who can make only a short stay, and \$5.00 for those who can stay a week or more.

The C. P. R. passenger trains will stop at Hector while the Camp is in operation, with the exception of trains Nos. 2, 7 and 8.

The Camp will be operated by Colonel Phil Moore and Mrs. Moore.

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
