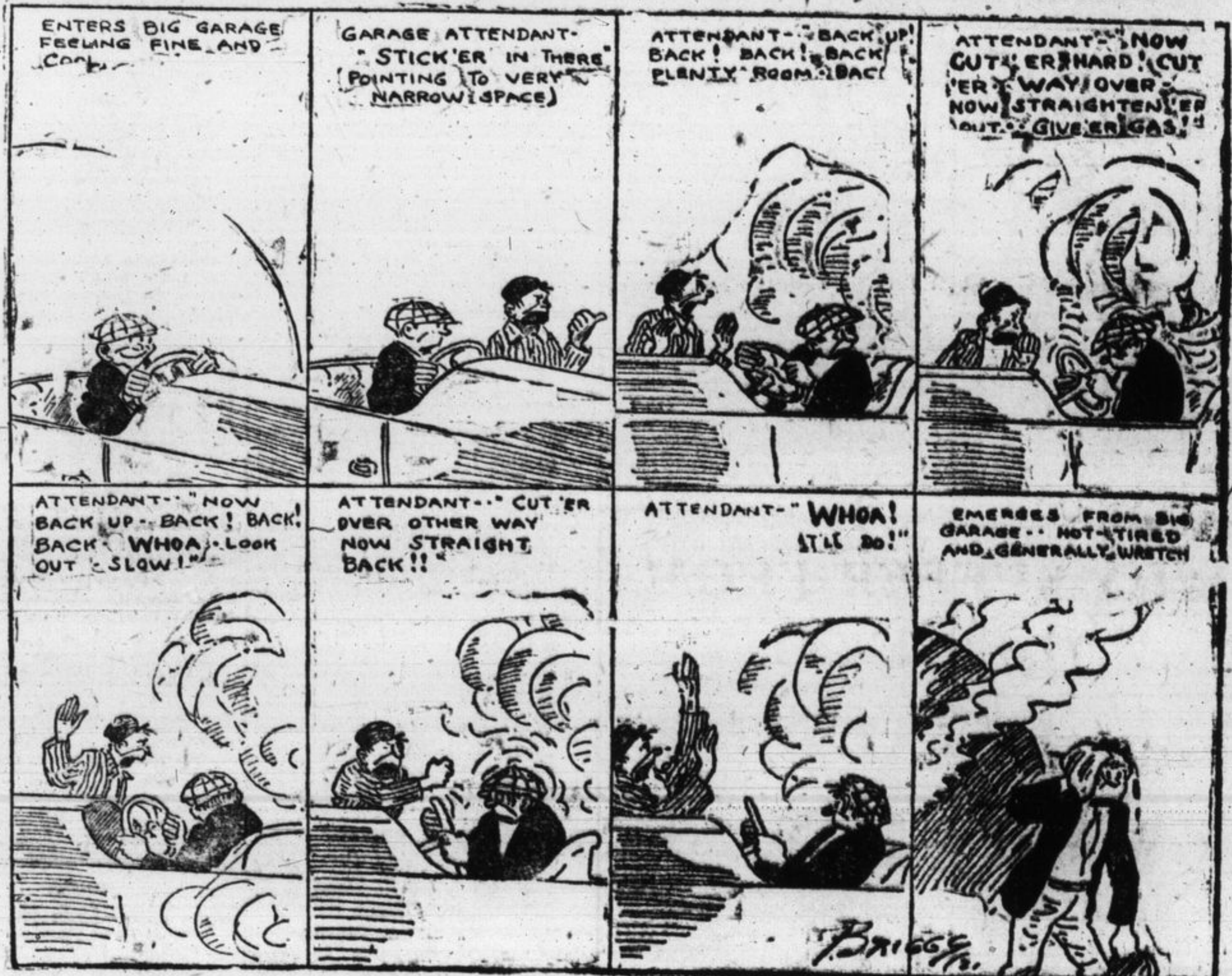
**People Are Crowding In.**

 An oculist's bill is apt to affect the eyesight.

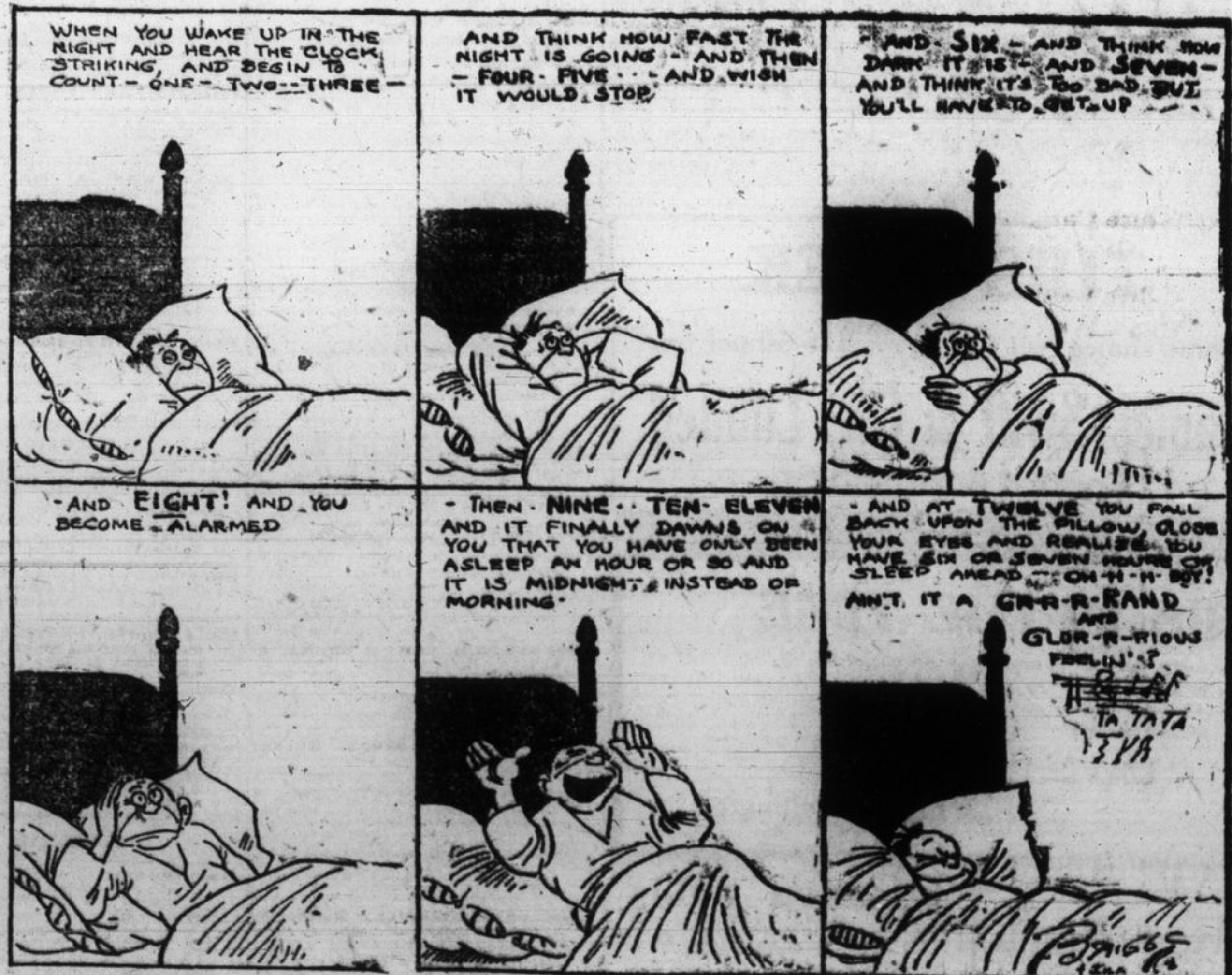
