### ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE ENTRY

#### New Regulations Governing Admission of Cadets From Provinces.

The militia department announces that steps are now being taken to bring into effect the new regulations governing admission of cadets to the Royal Military College. These provide for the yearly vacancies being distributed among the provinces in proportion to population. Candidates from each province will have to pass a competitive examination on the following lines:

In Nova Scotia candidates must have a high school certificate of Grade XI, with pass of fifty per cent on obligatory subjects, or an average of 80.

In New Brunswick, examination for provincial junior matriculation. In Prince Edward Island, second year certificate of the Prince of Wales College.

In Quebec (English speaking) junior matric, McGill; (French speaking) junior matric, Montreal and Laval.

Ontario, examination for junior matric in arts.

Manitoba, provincial junior matric.

Saskatchewan, examination including French, for provincial junior matric in science.

Alberta, grade XI diploma.

British Columbia, provincial junior matric in arts.

Candidates will only be eligible through the province of their permanent residence, must be between 16 and 19, and physically fit. A board of selection will be appointed in each province to consider applications, the secretary being an officer of the headquarters of the militia district in which the candidate is situated. The first vacancies to be filled under the new regulations will be those occurring in 1922.

### SEND TORONTO'S MESSAGE

#### Rev. Salem G. Bland Makes Suggestion That City Can Further King's Wish.

Writing in the Toronto Telegram on the Irish question, Rev. S. G. Bland, D.D., says: "One can understand, in a measure at least, the feeling aroused in Ireland by the treacherous and cruel assassinations which have been dignified as war. Those who justify them as war have no right to complain of the reprisals that have followed. Such reprisals, human nature being what it is, were inevitable, and the guilt of them lies in those who provoked them. The reprisals themselves have been mild compared with those which would have followed in actual war. But now in this night of horror there is, at least, the glimmer of the dawn."

The noble words of the King have borne fruit. A frank invitation to a conference has been extended. The South of Ireland, however, seems to be embracing the opportunity more cordially than the north. Ulster and the friends of Ulster have incurred a grave responsibility in the past in defaulting measures which Ulster today would probably accept with alacrity. It would be an infinite tragedy if Sir James Craig should in the slightest degree be held back by an unyielding attitude on the part of some whom he represents.

The approaching conference may be a world of blessing or a world calamity. The peace of the world depends on nothing so much as on a good understanding between the British Empire and the United States. Such an understanding seems unattainable as long as there is unrest in Ireland. For Ireland's own sake peace is imperative. It is monstrous that a people so gifted, so warm hearted and so likable should longer be torn by intestine strife.

Outside Ulster there is probably no city in the world where Ulster has so many friends as Toronto, nor any city a word from which "would carry weight in Ulster."

A message in this crisis from unquestionable friends of Ulster in Toronto, breathing sympathy and counselling the utmost effort to reach an understanding with Southern Ireland, might strengthen Sir James Craig in his manifest wish, moderate extremists who at present seem implacable, and help incalculably towards peace in Ireland and the abolition of war in the world.

### HAD MIRACULOUS ESCAPE

#### Young Woman Met With Accident in the Motordrome.

Aida Hager, a young woman taking part in the performance given in a motordrome at the fair-grounds, had a miraculous escape from death, on Wednesday afternoon. She was travelling at a fast rate of speed near the top, and through some mishap, fell off her bicycle into the pit, and her wheel fell on her. She was rushed to the General hospital, as it was feared that she had suffered terrible injuries, but on an examination being made, it was found that no bones had been broken, and that she was merely suffering from shock.

At the General hospital on Thursday morning the Whig was informed that the young woman had recovered from her experience, and that she was leaving the institution during the forenoon. James Reid's ambulance was called to remove the victim of the accident to the hospital.

##### TEN YEARS AGO.

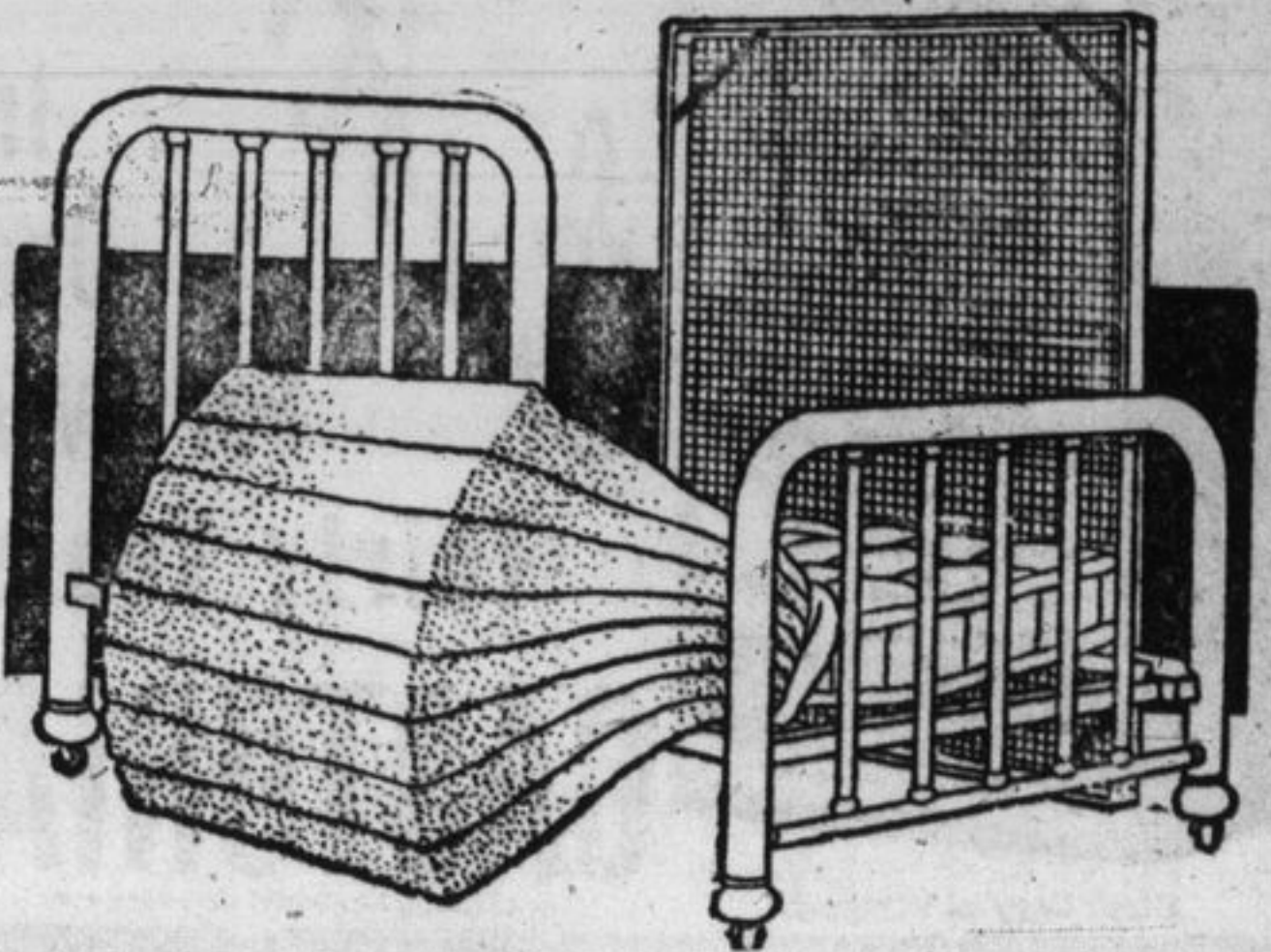
