Relics of Pioneer Days



To adequately celebrate the tercentenary at Pochung on August 2nd an archaeological party has been unearthing a number of relics of the past. Above is shown, on the left, an old entry box of 1812, which was discovered on the Quigley farm and was being used to shelter a clucking hen and her brood. On the right, the collection includes an Indian skull, cedar palisades from the Jesuit fort, St. Marie II., of 1630, on Christian Island; Col. Alex. Fraser's reproduction of Pere Potier's Huron manuscripts—a recent work issued by the Ontario government, which is causing a furore among the archaeologists of America.
