But It Was a False Alarm**

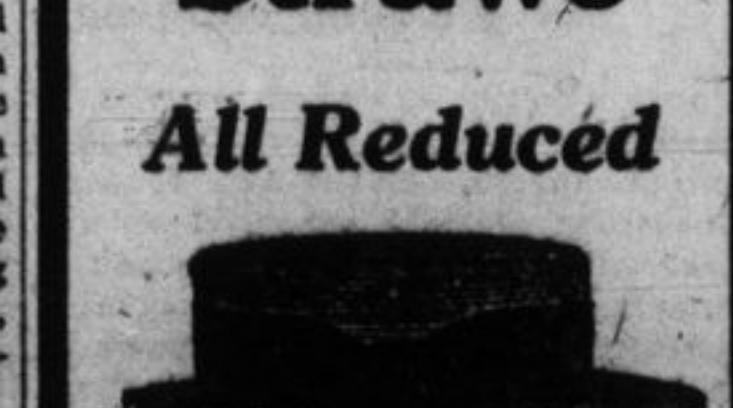
