

"The old practise of having farmers' wool made into clothing for the use of the farmer's own family is be ing revived in Hastings," stated A. D. McIntosh, of Stirling, agriculture representative for the country. "How extensive the revival is was brought home to me when I took my own wool to a local mill for this purpose and was told that there were so many other farmers ahead of me that I would have to walt two weeks before my work could be touched.
