**Montreal Athletics Win 6 to 3; Beat Ponies Out in Close Game**

A good crowd turned out to the cricket field last evening to see Montreal Athletics win their second game from Ponies by a score of 6 to 3 after a close run with the issue in doubt all the time. Two or three little mix-ups and chronic weakness with the willow prevented the locals from defeating this crack team but they gave them about as good a run as they will find this season. Cherry's three bagger in the seventh brought the crowd up standing which is an unusual sign of interest for Kingston fans.

Gallagher had a hard aggregation to buck but pitched well, though not doing anything much in advance of his usual form. Nine hits were rapped off his delivery, a tribute to the batting powers of the visiting team. Eight men were sent the strike-out route and five walked.

Morgan was on the mound for the visitors and will be remembered as the player who threw for Ogdonsburg here earlier in the year, holding Ponies to two hits and no runs. The locals did a little better this time, taking six hits from him among which were Cherry's triple and Coyne's two-bagger. Morgan struck out five and walked one.

Gallagher got away to a poor start when he walked Carmel and Davidson in the opening round. Tamm banged one towards the trees but Thompson got under it. Flaherty singled, scoring Carmel. Lamothe popped to Gallagher who doubled, catching Davidson off second.

Thompson was hit and walked. J. Evans and Daly fanned and Saunders laid one down that was lobbed to second to catch Thompson.

Athletics, 1; Ponies, 0.

In the second Delisle struck out. Papineau and Marvin singled and things might have been interesting but Morgan fanned and Carmel popped to Evans at short.

Gallagher popped to Carmel and Cherry drove a high one to Lamothe. Hornbeck grounded to Tamm and went out at first.

Athletics just faded away in the third. Davidson fouled to Twigg, Tamm struck out and Flaherty

grounded to Bill Evans. Twigg started away well, beating a bunt to first. Evans grounded to Morgan but moved Twigg up a step by going out at first. Thompson popped to Tamm and Johnny Evans to Papineau.

The fourth rolled by just as quickly. Lamothe popped to Twigg, Delisle grounded to the same player. Papineau made first when Hornbeck misjudged his fly. Marvin struck out.

Daly struck out, Saunders grounded to Papineau and Gallagher struck out.

In the fifth the Montreal team started out to gather in some runs. The first up, Morgan, walked. Carmel singled. Davidson picked a two-bagger, scoring Morgan and Carmel. Tamm singled scoring Davidson but was nipped at third when Flaherty grounded to Twigg. Flaherty, in turn, went out at second when Lamothe grounded to Twigg. Delisle grounded to Saunders.

Cherry grounded to Davidson, Coyne flied to Lamothe and Twigg grounded to Tamm.

Montreal Athletics, 4; Ponies, 0.

In the sixth Papineau singled. Marvin struck out. Morgan walked. Carmel grounded to Daly but all three players stayed on when Daly made a poor throw. Davidson grounded to Evans at short but he made a poor throw to Johnny and Papineau scored. Tamm popped to Evans. Flaherty singled, scoring Morgan but Carmel was caught at the plate when he tried to follow in.

Bill Evans started the ball rolling for the locals when he put a nice single over second. He died at second when Thompson grounded to Papineau. J. Evans fouled to Flaherty. Daly singled, and Saunders followed, scoring Thompson. Daly scored on Flaherty's error at the plate. Gallagher struck out, leaving Saunders at third.

Montreal Athletics, 6; Ponies, 2.

In the seventh Lamothe walked. Delisle struck out. Papineau made first when Gallagher chose to try for the man at second and failed by a wicked throw. With two men on Gallagher fanned Marvin and Morgan.

Cherry opened out with a triple, beating the throw for a score when Coyne flied to Delisle. Twigg made first on Carmel's error but was left on when W. Evans' flied to Delisle and Thompson grounded to Papineau.

This brought the score to 6 to 3 for the visitors and so it stayed. Nothing eventful happened in the remaining two innings. Tamm picked a two-bagger in the eighth but died on third and Coyne, coming up in the ninth with two down, manfully did his duty and revived a faint hope by rapping another two-bagger. Twigg failed to follow up, grounding to Papineau.

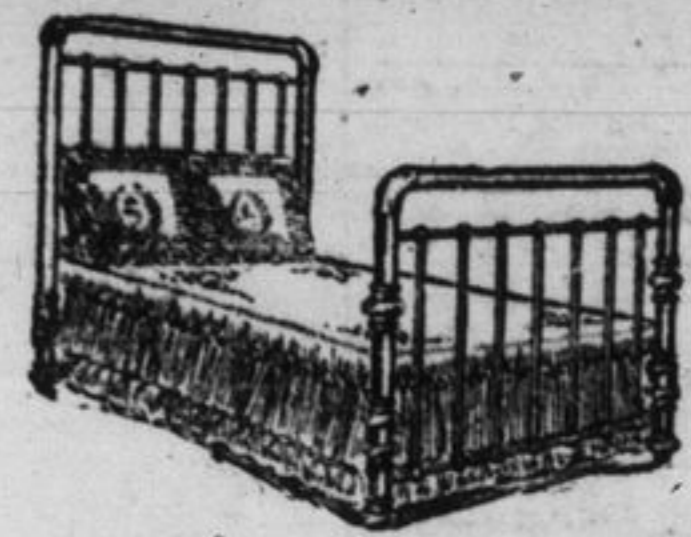
