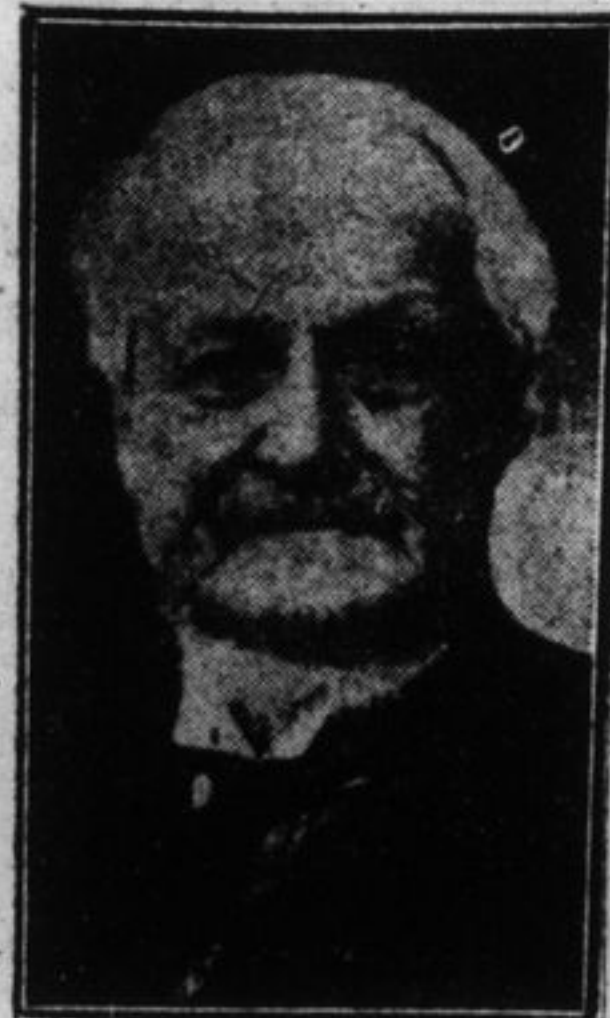

Circuses and Veterans

Speaking for the local unit of the Army and Navy Veterans before the city council on Wednesday, July 13th when the council was considering the expediency of granting a permit to a carnival company to show in Kingston, J. G. Evans explained to the council that Association he represented was to receive a percentage of not less than \$800, which he promised would be an unemployment fund for relief of unemployed returned soldiers, and he further stated that he had employment at the show grounds for sixteen returned men as ticket men at the various side shows, etc.

An appeal of this sort did not pass unheeded by our city council, a number of whom are former soldiers. Permission was granted by a vote of only 9 to 7, and it may well be that this appeal for the needy veteran was the deciding factor in the council's vote in favor of the carnival. Consequently it would seem to be very much the public's right to know how the commandant carried out his stipulation to give employment to the returned soldier.

The commandant's contributed report of his Monday's meeting does not contain the information sought, but states that a detailed account of the carnival week will be given out at the next regular weekly meeting.

Will it be asking too much that the names of the unemployed returned soldiers who benefited by carnival week be given to the public, along with the number of days each worked and the amount that was paid to each. We shall await this information with interest.
