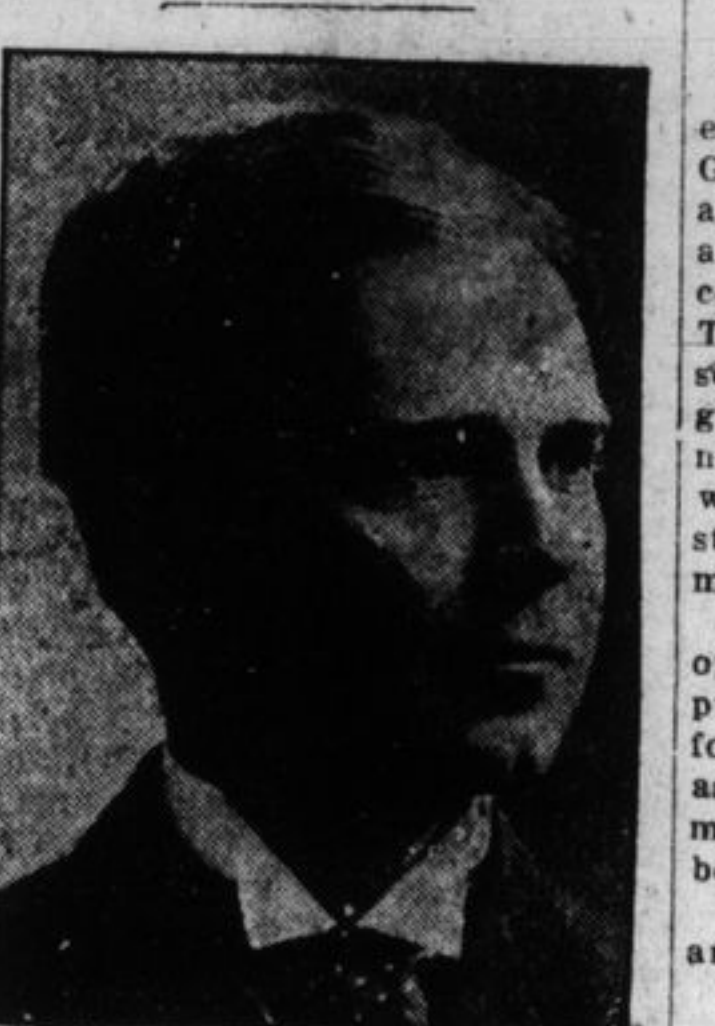
Preparing to Built Power Plant on King Street West—The Infectious Building Will Be Opposite This Site—City to Straighten Road.

APPEALS FOR ALLIED HELP

Turkish Nationalist Leader Seeks a Truce With the Greeks.

London, July 28.—Mustapha Kemal Pasha, head of the Turkish Nationalist government, has sent a telegram to Constantinople asking that the central government intervene with the allies in an effort to obtain a cessation of Graeco-Turk hostilities, according to despatches from Constantinople to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

SEARCHED GERMAN GUNS

London, July 28.—In a desperate effort to save themselves from the Greeks' invasion, the Turkish Nationalists this week are purchasing arms and ammunition from Germany, according to reliable information. Turkish agents have approached several sources seeking machine guns and ordnance, but they were not successful as the large pieces were delivered to the Allies or destroyed under the entente's disarmament ultimatum.

Turks Evacuate Ismid

London, July 28.—The Turkish Nationalists have decided to evacuate Ismid Peninsula, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Constantinople, owing to the Greek advance in the direction of Adabazar at the base of the peninsula, which lies to the east of Constantinople between the Sea of Marmora and the Black Sea.
