HE NOW USES A CRUTCH INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

A Severe Accident to a Naval Brigade Boy at the Headquarters.

Last Friday evening a few of the Naval Brigade boys met their officers to discuss going into camp this week, and incidentally discussed what might be done, in way of expressing sympathy, for Brigade Boy Russell Wilson who had his foot badly hurt by the toppling over of a large stone in the front entrance of the Veterans building, where the brigade has its headquarters, about four weeks ago.

The accident to young Wilson is especially unfortunate. The stone in question, a block of limestone about five feet by two feet, by seven or eight inches in thickness and having a carved coat of arms intended for placing over the front entrance of the building, had been lying for nearly six months on its edge in the front hallway between the door and the stairway. Boys belonging to the brigade have loitered here on their way in and out of the building, and the block of limestone has offered a seat too attractive to be resisted. It has been for months the regular thing for those passing in and out of the building to see boys perched upon this stone, which needed but little to make it fall over and perhaps injure someone for life.

Patrons of the building and members of the association have wondered when the stone was going to be put in place. The stone was carved (and is by the way a fine piece of work) at the penitentiary, and delivered late last winter. Some members of the association were stone masons and with the idea of giving employment to such, tenders were invited, and we understand that one tender was received, the work to start as soon as weather became warmer so as to allow cement to set properly. The property committee at first had charge of the matter, but month after month passed with nothing done until finally the commandant told the meeting that if the matter was left in his hands he would see that the stone was put into place by a regular engineer and without cost to the association.

The accident occurred on July 2nd and young Wilson was taken to the Kingston General hospital with a fracture of the arch or instep bone of the foot. After remaining there thirteen days he was conveyed to his home, 365 King street, and is now just able to go about the house with a crutch. It will be some time before it is certain whether he will ever regain the full use of his foot. His mother, a widow, now Mrs. Pultz, is deserving of sympathy, as her only other son, Harold Wilson, is a permanent invalid from spinal meningitis and goes about on crutches. He is employed by Dr. Nash, the dentist.

MRS. SHULTZ DIES AT RIVER

Was A Summer Resident For Fifty Years. Mrs. Louise Shultz, aged nearly eighty years, widow of the late Carl H. Shultz, and a summer resident of the Thousand Islands for the past 50 years, died on Friday at the home opposite Point Vivian. She had been in failing health for some time and recently suffered a stroke of paralysis.

He has written a letter to the chairman of the Hamilton board asking if he can give him any suggestions towards recovering one of the animals that swam out into the lake and landed on an island where he is monarch of all he surveys. The letter states that thirteen men have been secured to chase him off the island but the former king of the plains disdains all their efforts at capture. The other bisons are placidly content on the Ducks Island, but the other is evidently socially their superior because he refuses to mix.

"If that man knew the trouble we had getting those beasts on the train he wouldn't ask us for help," declared Charles Stewart, secretary of the Hamilton parks board. The local board can't give any help, the Hamilton Spectator adds. The buffaloes in question arrived in Kingston on the night of July 1st by Grand Trunk and were shipped from the foot of Brock street on a scow to the Ducks Island, where Mr. Cole has quite a number of wild animals, including a white doe, and the Canadian government is interested in his venture.

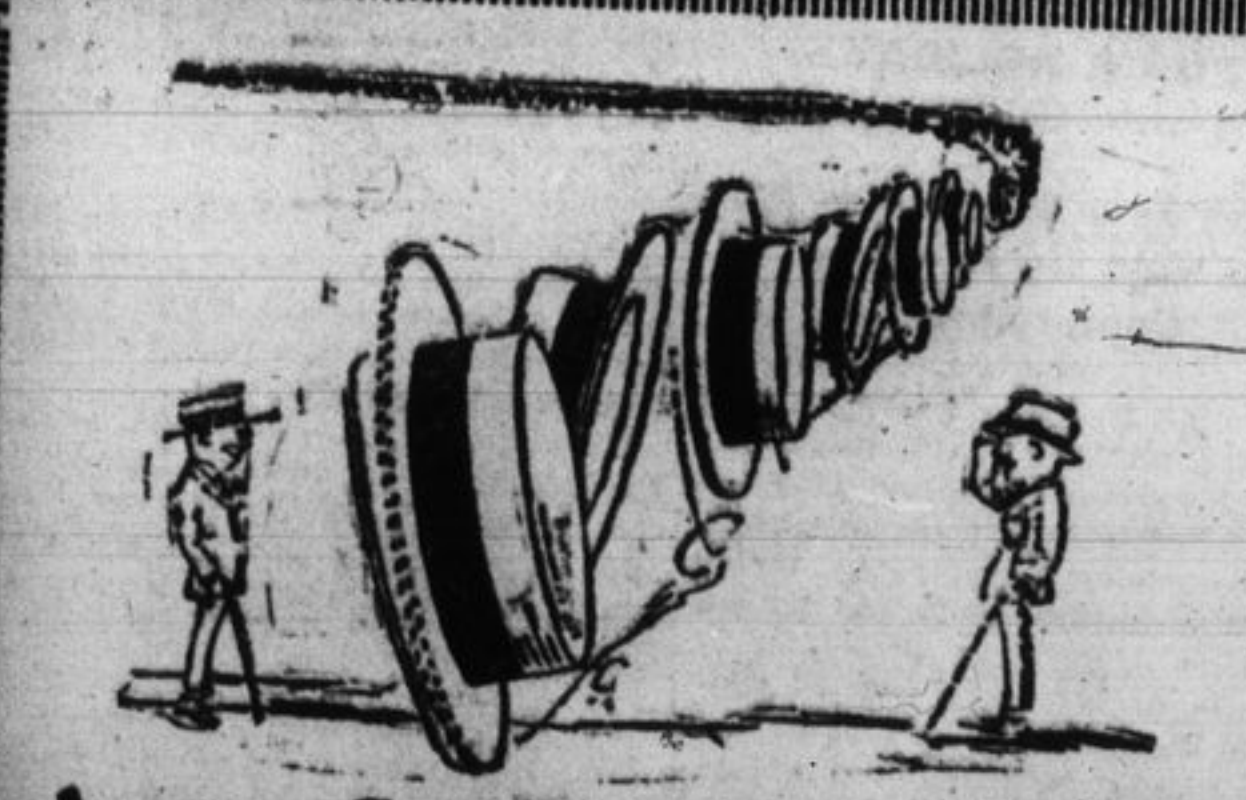
