WAS PLACED UNDER ARREST

Barclay Thompson Rounded Up by High Constable Samuel Brien.

Barclay Thompson, the aged man who "squatted" on Bass Island, and who is accused of shooting at some fishermen, was placed under arrest by High Constable Samuel Brien, of Lennox and Addington. He elected to be tried by a judge, and will come before Judge Madden, on August 31st. In the meantime he will undergo medical examination as to his sanity. The charge against him is that of having firearms in his possession.

It is alleged that on Sunday last, Thompson who lives on the island with his mother, ordered two fishermen, a man named Whyndrew, of Napanee, and a man named Woods, of Roblin, away, while they were out in a boat fishing, and that he fired several shots and sunk the boat, but afterwards rescued the fishermen, and told them to keep away or he would kill them. Information was laid against Thompson and High Constable Brien made a trip to the island and took the accused in charge.

M.P.'S ARE TREATED TO A VAUDEVILLE TRICK

Disappearing Canary Stunt in Commons—Chimpanzees Wait in Vain.

London, Aug. 4.—The select committee now sitting in the house of commons to inquire into the training of performing animals was entertained yesterday by an illusionist who was allowed to show the members a disappearing canary trick and refute the statement that he killed the bird. A member of the committee was asked to take the bird from a large cage and put it into a trick cage. Holding the cage between both hands in front of him, the illusionist gave a loud halloo, and the bird and the cage disappeared. From behind a curtain he then produced the canary, unruffled and chirping as it got back into its former home.

There were other performances offered to the committee, Max and Moritz, famous chimpanzees, were brought to the house of commons and waited about all day with some of their playthings, including a tiny bicycle, but they were not allowed inside. Disappointment was felt by other trainers that they were not allowed to get their animals inside St. Stephens, but a policeman on duty humorously suggested the only things that might be smuggled in were performing fleas.

This was the first day on which trainers and others opposed to the new bill brought up the full force of their case and there was a big crowd outside unable to gain admission. Witnesses before the committee included several leading trainers, all of whom denied that cruelty was the persuasive force that made their animals do tricks. Some trainers are issuing challenges to anyone who can prove the cruelty charges in their work.

TRYON PLACED ON TRIAL

For the Shooting of His Daughter at Home in Kaladar.

The preliminary hearing in the case of Kenneth Tryon, charged with shooting his daughter, Cecelia Tryon, aged seventeen years, at their home at Kaladar, on June 10th, was commenced Thursday afternoon, before Magistrate Floyd at Northbrook. The case was opened at two o'clock, and it was expected that evidence in the case would be concluded at five o'clock.

U. M. Wilson, crown attorney, of Napanee, is conducting the prosecution, with J. M. Simpson, Napanee, as counsel for the accused. The latter is about fifty-five years of age, and has been held in the Napanee jail, pending his trial.

Cecelia Tryon, the daughter, has been confined to the Kingston General hospital since the shooting occurred, but was able to attend the hearing and tell her story. At the time of the shooting, very little hope was entertained for her recovery.

ASSAULTED WIFE AND THEN RAN AWAY

Lively Row in Home on Wellington Street Wednesday.

The liveliest kind of a row took place at a home on Wellington street about five o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, and there was great excitement in the neighborhood while the affair lasted. A call was sent to the police, but the call was not sent in soon enough to give the police a chance to take a hand in the affair.

The trouble, so it is alleged, was caused by a man assaulting his wife out on the roadway and kicked her, and then securing possession of their baby, made off. The wife secured a taxi and endeavored to locate her hubby but he managed to make his escape.

People who witnessed the affair, state that the attack made by the man on his wife was a most brutal one.

"HE SWORE MY LIFE AWAY"

What William McFadden Said About Jack Conley.

In his death message to the newspapers, William McFadden, hanged at Toronto on Wednesday morning, spoke in terms of condemnation of one of the witnesses at his trial, Jack Conley, who is an inmate of Portsmouth penitentiary. He advised that any request for a reprieve for Conley should be vigorously fought. "He swore my life away," declared McFadden. It will be remembered that Conley swore that McFadden fired the fatal shot, which it is generally believed, even by Justice Logie, who presided at the trial, was fired by Holtrum.
