C. E. Leppard Writes About the Passing of His Wife. Further details of the sad death on July 23rd of Mrs. Leppard, wife of C. E. Leppard, past president of Queen's summer school, were received in the city in a letter from Mr. Leppard. The death occurred at Riverhurst, Sask., when Mrs. Leppard was visiting Mrs. F. Rudd, her sister, preparatory to coming east to meet her husband at the close of the summer school in August.

As Mr. Leppard had passed his classes and was completing the fourth of the summer sessions necessary for his degree, the university senate, in view of the sad circumstances, is granting him his degree in the fall.
