Vienna, Aug. 11.—A Czecho-Slovakian vicar near Prague refused yesterday to christen a boy "William" as this is the name of the ex-Kaiser. The father of the infant is strongly opposing such a boycott and threatens a lawsuit on the ground that William is also a Christian name in allied countries, belonging, among others, to William the Conqueror and Shakespeare.

LORD BYNG OF VIMY.

He Was Sworn in As Canada's Governor-General. Quebec, Aug. 11.—With the guns from the ancient citadel booming out a salute, the whistling of river craft, the ringing of bells and the applause of crowds, Lord Byng of Vimy, Canada's new governor-general, landed at the King's wharf here to-day, and proceeded through belaguered streets to the provincial legislative buildings where he was sworn into office with pomp and impressiveness probably never equalled in the history of Canada.

Addresses of welcome were presented by Premier Taschereau on behalf of the province of Quebec and Mayor Samson on behalf of the city. Replying, Lord Byng explained how proud and delighted he was when His Majesty the King informed him he was to be governor-general of Canada, although he entered upon the duties with some trepidation he hoped he should receive the same sympathy and confidence as given him by the gallant Canadians with whom he served in the war.

Two Kingstonians On Canoe Trip to Ottawa

George Stewart and Earl Morris, two well-known Kingston young men left last Saturday on a canoe trip to Ottawa. They are paddling the Rideau to Ottawa, in easy stages, making the return trip by the Ottawa and St. Lawrence rivers, and will arrive home in a couple of weeks' time. George Stewart is one of Queen's best wrestlers, being intercollegiate champion in the 145-pound class, and Earl Morris is a brother of S. A. Morris, who with D. Pound, won honors in the canoe races at Gananoque a few years ago.

THE REPLY RECEIVED.

But Its Contents Not Known for Some Days. London, Aug. 11.—The reply of Eamon de Valera, Irish Republican leader, to the British government's Irish peace proposals was handed to Austen Chamberlain, government leader, in the House of Commons at noon today. The tenor of the reply was withheld. The official explanation was that it would be subject first to conferences by the cabinet, and that it was unlikely to be divulged for some days.

Remain Public Property.

London, Aug. 11.—Runnymede Meadows are to be retained as crown property. This official announcement was made in the House of Commons. It was welcomed with cheers. A rumor that Runnymede Meadows were to be sold by the government was cut into building lots, roused a tempestuous protest from the Marquis of Lincolnshire in the House of Lords, when the Marquis declared that, at the rate at which the government was disposing of crown lands, there soon would be nothing left to sell but the crown jewels.
