

#### CHILD DIES OF THROAT TROUBLE

Ruth Schram Passes Away in Sisters' Hospital-Taken With Paralysis.

Ruth H. Schram, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. FrankeD. Schram, Clayton, N.Y., died Wednesday at the Sisters' hospital, Watertown, N.Y., following an operation performed for the removal of toneils, aged eleven years.

The child had suffered from enlarged tonsils for several weeks and the parents decided to bring her to Watertown for the operation. She was taken to the City hospital, July 26th, and on that morning the operation was performed by a local specialist. The child was discharged from the hospital on the following day and returned to her home. Her throat was later examined by the physician and the parents were informed that she was in satisfactory

The child appeared normal and by the end of the week her throat was healed. Until a week ago Sunday she continued to improve. She was suddenly seized on that day by paralysis and was unable to eat and could scarcely speak. Everything possible was done to aid her but efforts were unavailing.

Emigrate From Ireland. London, Aug. 19 .- According to the Registrar-General of Ireland. 15,585-6,075 males and 9,510 females—emigrated from Ireland during the year ending 1920. Of these 12,287 went to the United States. An analysis of the latter figure shows Leinster 1,180, Munster 4,490, Ulster 2,889, Connaught 3,728. From May, 1851, when the collection returns commenced, to December 31st. 1921, the total of Irish emigrants was 4,338,199, the equivalent of 83.2
