Numerous accidents and side attractions somewhat made up for the poor ball. Cherry was hit by a pitched ball and given a punt arm which put him out of the game. Derry followed suit in the fourth. He singled to right field and was struck in the forehead by Woods' throw to first just as he reached the bag.

The visitors started off batting well and brought in their only run on some nice playing. When they took the field however, it was seen that Ladouceur's arm was not working and Walters was forced to go in the box in spite of pitching Thursday evening. He could not reach his usual form and his support seemed to be paralysed, with the large score resulting.

Walters was warned and he went out at the plate. Twigg singled to left, scoring Saunders. W. Evans walked. Coyne bunted in front of the plate and McNeill was forced out by McPherson.

From then on there was no danger to the local team. In the sixth the Burg got two singles and had two on but the danger was passed over without score on their part. Saunders held them well, four hits being marked up against him in four rounds and one walk.

G. AWREY FOR QUEEN'S

Definitely Announced Last Night—How Things Are Going With Rink.

It is now definitely announced by Queen's Athletic Board of Control that George Awrey, of Hamilton, is coming to Queen's this fall, to supervise rugby and other athletics. The decision was only arrived at and passed upon by the board at a late hour last night and other statements before that time had no official backing.

Mr. Awrey comes here with a great reputation behind him. His new position will amount to something similar to a chair in athletics, with full supervision of all sports and active administrative work in connection with the Athletic Board of Control.

With James Bews back and George Awrey coming, not to mention prospect for a fine rugby team to start away with, and a new skating rink following on the heels of the George Richardson Stadium, things are certainly looking bright for Queen's athletics and Queen's University in general.

Rink Going Fine.

Queen's new Jock Hartly rink is now under way. The old covered rink is fast disappearing before the onslaught of a gang of men employed by Anglin & Co., while the houses on Arch street are also going by the board. One of them will be moved from its present position to the corner of Deacon & Arch and work has been started on it.

The campaign among the graduates of Queen's outside Kingston is progressing well meanwhile. Very good reports are coming in from the different cities which have organized their own centres and the mail canvass is meeting with an encouraging response.

Monday, the canvass of Kingston graduates begins, though Kingston generally will not be canvassed for some time. There are many graduates of the old university still in the Limestone City and these men will be visited next week. At the same time the subscription lists will be thrown open to any persons wishing to subscribe.

The offer of the Athletic Board of Control in connection with this will no doubt be taken advantage of by many people. All local subscribers giving \$50 or over will have the privilege of buying four tickets for any hockey match one day before the seat plan opens to the general public. Tickets will be issued to citizens having this privilege, in order that they may avail themselves of it by presentation of the tickets bearing their names.

One pleasing incident has gone on record in the local canvass so far, that being the donation of a substantial cheque to the cause by J. Edwin ("Eddie") Hawley just before his departure for India on geological work.

Youth Proves Surprise In Canoe Race Carnival

Gordon Douglass of the Knickerbocker Canoe Club, New York city, thus far has presented the biggest surprise at the national regatta of the American Canoe association, now in progress at Sugar Island, one of the Thousand Islands. Young Douglass, who is sixteen years of age, has just branched into the decked canoe sailing class. In his new boat, the Nymph, he has furnished the chief competition to Leo Friede, world champion canoe sailor, who is there for his sixth consecutive win of the national championship. Douglass was the winner of the first sailing contest for his class, preliminary to the championship race. In three other races, Douglass won one and Friede two.

In the open canoe sailing events thus far the honors have all gone to members of the Knickerbocker Canoe Club, New York. Frank Palmer took first in the three-mile race from Sugar Island to Gananoque, Ont., and in the race over the triangular course of the Gananoque Canoe Club. In a three-mile race returning to Sugar, Dudley T. Cashmore finished first with Payne L. Kretzmore, a veteran who is now attending his twenty-sixth regatta, second and Palmer third. Cashmore was second in the triangular race and third in the trip to Gananoque. Kretzmore was third and second, respectively.
