land.

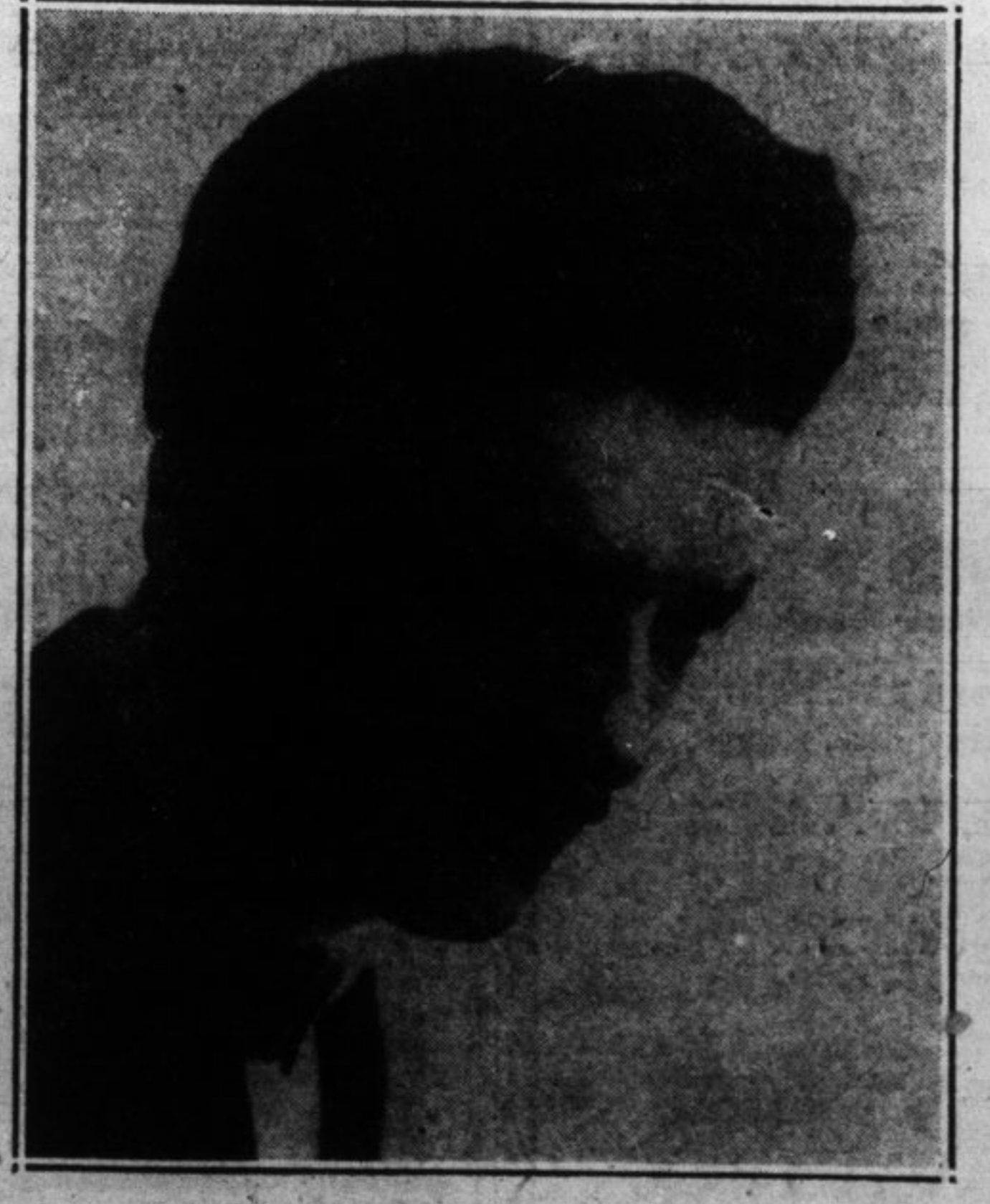
**Engagements Announced.**
