GOOD SATURDAY MARKET

Though It Is Still Scattered About the Surrounding Streets.

A very good market gathered behind the city hall Saturday morning, but the farmers and market gardeners are still forced onto the side streets by the paving work going on in the square. The one section that is completed caused much favorable comment from those who were on hand early enough to take up their stand there.

Prices still stay at about the same level. The only drop of any importance being in tomatoes, which were as low as 50 cents per bushel this morning.

Other prices were: Veal, hinds, 20 cents pound, fronts 10c pound; lamb, hinds 25c pound, fronts 20c pound; fowls, \$1 each; chickens, from \$1.25 to \$2 per pair; butter, 50c to 55c a pound; eggs, 40 to 45c dozen; corn, 15c dozen and 2 for 25c; potatoes, \$2 and \$2.25 per bushel; onions, 75c per peck; cauliflower, 30c and 40c each; cabbages, 15c each or 2 for 25c; bottling pears, \$1.25 per peck; Fleming beauties, 75c peck; pickling pears, 40c peck; apples, 40c to 70c per peck; muskmelons, from 5c each to 25c; watermelons, 10c to 25c each; honey, 5 pounds for \$1. Cooke brothers, Cataract, had four boxes of strawberries on sale at 50c per box. Needless to say, everyone was surprised to see the berries.

The plan of the commercial elements is to start an extensive propaganda intended to make clear Japan's sincere attitude. The mission's idea is to give moral support in the form of strong background to Japan's official delegation at the conference of limitation of armaments in Washington.

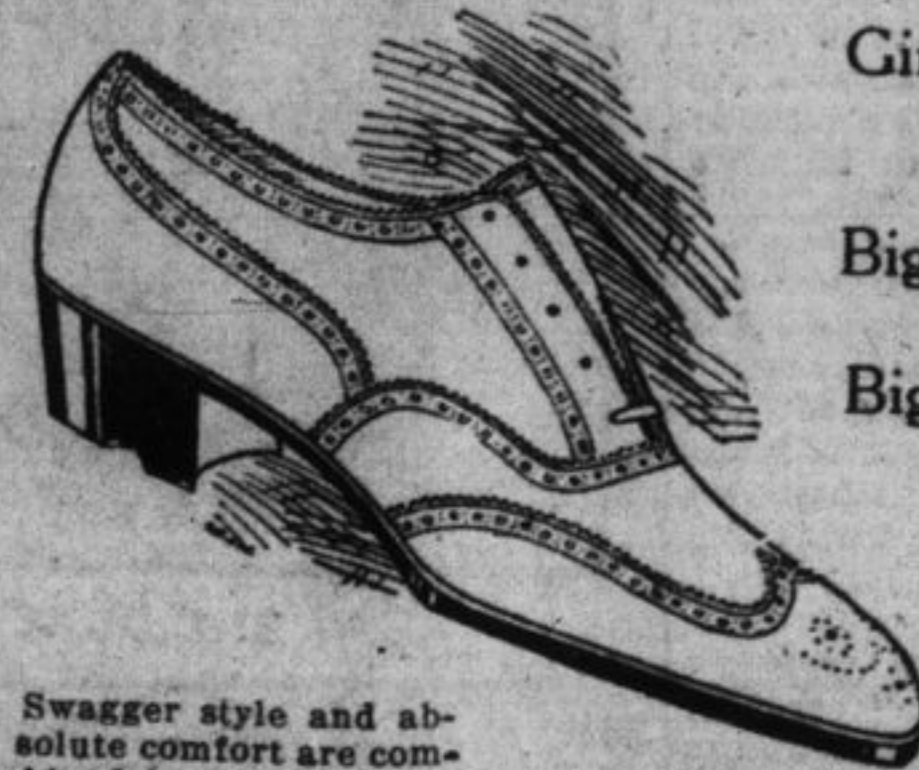
