READY FOR THE OPENING OF THE FAIR ON TUESDAY

The Midway a Big Attraction—Putting the Exhibits in Readiness.

The fair grounds was a scene of the greatest activity on Saturday and Sunday, and thousands visited the grounds to see the pacers and trotters arriving, and the Brown and Dyer Shows erect the Midway city that will be one of the greatest attractions. There are in addition to the usual sensations and other curiosities, seven cars of trained animals and a big wild west show. These will make the main show one of unusual merit.

On Sunday the grounds were in very fine condition and the weather has been ideal since making the prospects of success very bright. On Monday morning the merchants and others who have taken up the display space in the main buildings and the grounds outside the buildings, began to move in their exhibits, and an army of assistants and workmen were engaged all day in order that everything will be in readiness for the opening on Tuesday afternoon. The programme to-morrow will be as follows:

1.00 p.m.—Official opening.
Trials of speed—3.00 minute class, \$350; 2.30 class, \$350.
Judging of all harness horses in front of the grand stand.

Judging of single turnout, driven by a lady, will take place between 3 and 5 o'clock.
Band concert.

Physical drill by navy brigade, including club swinging, signalling, wrestling, etc.
Balloon ascension.
Rings comedy circus.

Fireworks in the evening.
The Brown & Dyer people's big plot inside the track jammed with industry as the various attractions took shape. Great tents and booths are being erected in addition to the dozens already up, in preparation for a big week's business.

In the palace all four wings sent forth the joyous sounds of work and business. The local merchants are all busy making their booths and exhibits the best that they can possibly produce, and there certainly will be some good ones. To-morrow a detailed list of the exhibitors will be published.

Besides the local booths there are about a dozen companies from other centres exhibiting in the palace. Full descriptions of these will be given in to-morrow's Whig.

The various agricultural exhibits, stock, poultry, produce, etc., are well in order for the big opening day to-morrow.

All over-town, from the waterfront to the fair grounds, the talk is of the exhibition. Nothing else holds any interest and even the bandits of last week are partly forgotten in the bustle, hustle and excitement of preparing for Kingston industrial exhibition, the best ever shown in Kingston and one of the best Canada produces.

LORD BYNG TO ARRIVE AT 11 A.M. ON TUESDAY

His Excellency to Spend Afternoon at the Royal Military College.

The official programme announced by the Royal Military College during the visit of His Excellency, the Governor-General, Lord Byng, on Tuesday, is as follows:

Arrive at C.N.R. station at 11 a.m.; inspect P.W.O.R. guard of honour at station; leave for R.M.C. with mounted escort of gentlemen cadets by the following route: Earl street to King, along to Princess, down to Ontario and thence to the college, arriving there at 11.35; inspect college buildings at 11.50; witness physical training class in gymnasium from 11.50 to 12.20; riding 12.20; luncheon with Major-General Sir A. C. Macdonell and staff 1 p.m. After lunch Lord Byng will address the cadets in Currie hall at 2.10, and at 2.30 he will witness the aquatic sports. His Excellency will be the guest of C.E.F. officers at a dinner in Grant hall in the evening.

ANOTHER PROVINCIAL ROAD CONTRACT GIVEN

McGinnis and O'Connor to Continue Highway on to Finger Board.

A contract for further road work has been received by McGinnis and O'Connor, who have built stretches of road both east and west of the city that are said by travellers on the highway to be some of the best. The work on the Gananoque road is practically completed, and following a visit of officials of the department of provincial highways, a contract for the road work from the completion of the present contract on the Front road to what is known as the Finger Board at the junction of the middle and front roads, has been given to these contractors. The stretch is about two and one half miles, and will involve the opening of a new quarry and give two months' work.
