WANT TO EXTEND MAIN TO THE PENITENTIARY

In Order to Give Work to Unemployed—Utilities to Urge Matter.

A letter from Warden Ponsford of Portsmouth penitentiary was read at Monday afternoon's meeting of the Utilities Commission stating that he was not recommending that the proposed water main from the city be extended to the prison. The reason was not stated by the warden. It had been hoped by the commission that the penitentiary department would accept its offer to extend the city main to the penitentiary, as this extension would furnish work for the unemployed.

There was a discussion with regard to the starting of the gas main in Division street, which is to be paved next spring. Mayor Nickle wanted the work held off till later in the year when there would be more need of work for the unemployed.

Manager Folger was given permission to permit the use of hydrants for supplying water to people in want. As an instance, it was pointed out that the wells of Portsmouth are dry and it would be a kindly act to help out our neighbors, who would have to cart the water from the hydrant nearest the village.

G.W.V.A. Stipulates This and A. and N. Veterans Reject Proposal.

At a meeting of the executive of the Great War Veterans held on Monday evening, the matter of amalgamation, which was proposed at the mass meeting of the Veterans of Kingston in the Griffin theatre on Sunday afternoon, was taken into consideration. Plans for putting the resolution into effect were considered, and in order that a mutual basis for unity might be reached a resolution was drawn up inviting the Army and Navy Veterans, the only other veteran body in Kingston, to appoint a committee to meet the executive of the G.W.V.A. for the purpose of discussing this important matter to see what could be done.

Europe Still Lagging In Race to Improve

Washington, Sept. 20.—Signs of improved conditions in Europe are still few, according to the monthly summary of the economic and financial situation there, issued by the commerce department on the basis of cables reports from its foreign representatives.

Vienna Demands Union With Germany at Once

Vienna, Sept. 20.—A great demonstration and parade were held under Pan-German auspices in protest against "the ignominious peace and its resultant evils." Immediate union with Germany was demanded.

Cost Americans More To Keep Army in Germany

Paris, Sept. 20.—Statistics showing costs of maintaining the various allied armies of occupation in the Rhineland from the beginning of the armistice to May 1st, 1921, have been made public by the reparations committee. Figures computed by government show the maintenance cost of the United States forces of occupation to be \$278,067,010; those of France 230,485,470 French francs; England, 52,831,298 pounds sterling; Belgium, 378,731,390 Belgian francs, and Italy 15,207,717 French francs.

WEDS SEVENTH WIFE.

All Nonagenarian's Brides Were Sisters; Five Widows. Atlantic, Iowa, Sept. 20.—Fred Harris, ninety years old, has just married his seventh wife. All his wives were daughters of Peter Yost, who lived in Milwaukee, and sailed a freighter on the Great Lakes in the sixties.

Harris began by marrying the oldest daughter of Yost, and he has gone right down the line. The last five were widows. Mrs. Gustave Eidemann is the last bride, and she is now seventy-eight years old. Her husband, a farmer, perished in the Minnesota forest fires of 1918. She had been married twice before.

Harris who was a hack driver, and later driver of a horse car in Chicago, after the great fire, recently bought a small fruit farm here on which to pass his remaining years.
