At Sakell's. "There is something about Sakell's that no other place has," was the remark of a steady customer of the two downtown ice-cream and confectionery stores run by Sakell's. The first is at 180 Princess street, the Crystal Palace, and the other just above the Grand Opera House, at 220 Princess. The booth is a dandy. Remember also, that Sakell's ice cream is "Best by Test."

Vanluven Brothers—Ford Wherever you go, the world over, you find the Ford, and the Kingston Fair would indeed seem strange without it. In the northwestern corner of the main building, just inside the door from the race-track, we find the large space of Vanluven Brothers, Ford dealers and agents for the Ford company in this district. Here they show all the latest models in Ford cars and will give information about this automobile which has now become almost an international institution instead of a mere motor car.

On display Vanluven Brothers have the Ford five-passenger touring car, the handy car for the family; the beautiful Ford sedan, the closed in, five-passenger car of the Ford group; the Ford coupe, a car that has gained more favor in the past few months than any other; the light Ford truck, little two-passenger wonder, with its companion the light delivery truck, a transformation of the roadster for the man with light quick delivery service; and last of all that farm favorite, all complete and in running order, the Fordson Tractor, which performs the work of thrashing machines, water pumps, horses, men, everything about the farm.

There is no need to tell of the beauties of the Ford. It is known all over.
