SYNOD EXECUTIVE MEETS

Some of the Parishes Protest the New Necessary Apportionment.

Quite an unusual thing occurred on Tuesday in the affairs of the diocese of Ontario. The quarterly executive committee met and dispatched the day's business by noon, which enabled Bishop Bidwell to attend the function at the Royal Military College in connection with the visit of His Excellency the governor-general, Lord Byng, of Vimy.

An application from St. John's church, Portsmouth, to sell its rectory, was considered, and was referred to a committee to report later.

A few parishes protested the new missionary apportionment. The sum of \$100 was granted for special work in Bloomfield.

An application from the cathedral, for an increase in rent for the synod offices, was referred to a committee for a report.

Most of the time was occupied in considering parish allotments for this year for missions, and after much discussion, Francis King's report was allowed to stand, the members agreeing to do their best, which means that an effort is to be made this fall to raise \$23,000 for missions. The missionary clergy were voted \$50 increases, provided the missions give a similar amount.

It was reported that \$110,000 had been received on account of the forward movement and preparations are being made for the payment of the last installment on November 15th. Canon Jones was requested to visit the meetings of the fall assembly of the clergy in regard to the matter.
