### Horse Race Results At Fair, Tuesday

The sports at the fair got away to a good start Tuesday afternoon with a couple of fine horse races on the programme. The 3.00 and 2.30 classes were run off and provided amusement for a goodly crowd of spectators. The first class drew twelve entries the largest number seen at the fair in some years. The large number of horses made a fair start difficult and in the last heat the driver of City Princess, C. Rendalls, was ordered to the barn, which at first he refused to do but was later replaced by B. McCane and the next attempt was a go. The 3.00 class was won by Reta Hal, owned by J. Elmhurst, Indian River, which, after being nosed out by Directum Murphy, T. K. Nicholson, Kingston, in the first heat, won the next three. Helen C., owned by J. Orr, Belleville, won first money in the 2.30 class with Don Pedro, owned by Sherman G. Davidson, Brockville, second. In both the races number of horses were drawn due to minor injuries. The races were continued until dusk. W. Murray acted as starter. The heats were as follows:

### OLD RECORDS FALL ON GRAND CIRCUIT

Sanardo Does Mile in 1.59 3-4 at Syracuse, N.Y., in a Regular Race.

Sanardo, the great pacer who has not been seen very often this year on the Grand Circuit, broke the state fair race record at Syracuse, N.Y., on Friday, when he paced the fastest mile in a race exhibited on the "Big Line" this year. He went the mile in 1.59 3-4 in the second heat of the 2.03 pacing class. Sanardo was driven by Tommy Murphy, who has driven practically all the record-breakers at the fair.

### Looks Like Big Set Right in New York

The New York Giants continued their winning streak last week, and by their victories, notably the pair over Pittsburg, enjoy a substantial lead in the National league. Barrage a complete form reversal the pennant appears to be firmly in the grasp of the McGraw clan.

In the American league the New York team have played two games less than Cleveland and must play almost perfect ball in their remaining games to secure the flag. The four-games series to be played in New York this week between New York and Cleveland will probably decide the race.

Both New York teams are favored over their rivals for league honors in the matter of games to be played. To date the New York Americans have won the majority of their games against the Indians. The Kilties have three more games to play with Detroit before taking on Cleveland in the most trying series of the season.

### Dempsey-Willard Bout Seems Like Certainty

Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, stepped in on Tex Rickard at New York, and for more than an hour the big promoter and the pilot of the champion were cloistered in Rickard's private sanctum. Tex is anxious to settle all the preliminary details looking forward for another match between Dempsey and Willard. Kearns is willing that Jack shall start again with the big Kansas farmer, but wanted to talk it all over with Dempsey before tossing their signatures on the parchments.

Tex and Kearns have another date and it is expected that the matter will be clinched. Rickard has had Willard signed for some time. Jess wants no one but Dempsey. According to Rickard, Willard insists that he is entitled to another bout with Dempsey. The big farmer will never believe that Dempsey is the better man until the champion does it all over again.

### Death at Fallbrook

Fallbrook, Sept. 19.—A much respected resident of this place passed away on Sunday in the person of Andrew Bain. Mr. Bain had been in failing health for some time, but through the careful nursing of his wife he had become able to be up and about most of the time. On Sunday afternoon death came very suddenly, the cause being heart failure. The deceased was in his sixty-ninth year, and always resided in Fallbrook. He leaves to mourn his loss his wife and an adopted daughter, Miss Gertrude Stone, and an adopted son Joseph Jones. The funeral is to be held from his late residence on Tuesday and interment will be made at the Highland line cemetery.
