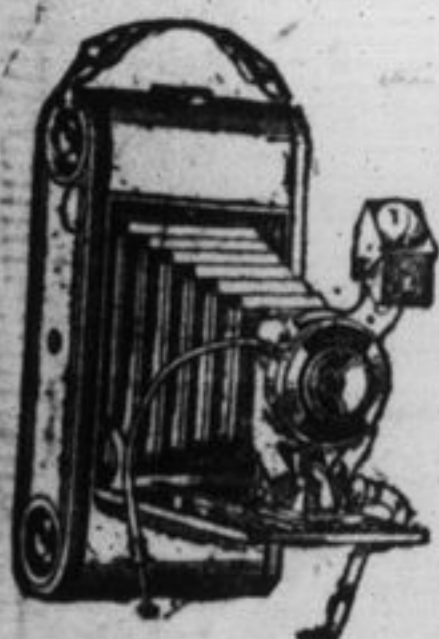


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In the World of Sport

Many of the boys begin to wonder if they are track or rugby candidates after they have been chased around the track a few times.

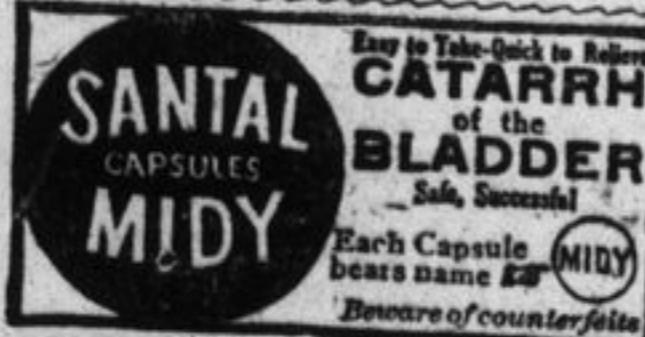
With the addition of a few newcomers it is safe to say that the squad will be much better than that of last year by the time the season begins.

More than 173,700 persons paid their way to see the world series last year between the Brooklyn Nationals and the Cleveland Americans, in which the latter team won five games to two. The official gross receipts were \$564,800.

English Swimming Marks Lowered.
Two English records, the 440 and 500 yards have been eclipsed by Arne Borg of Sweden, at Weston-Super-Mare. His time for the former distance was five minutes, eighteen seconds as against the standing record of five minutes 24 2-5 seconds, while for the 500 yards he returned six minutes one second, the British best time being 6 minutes 2 4-5 seconds.

OLD-TIME EXCURSIONS

Should Be Revived Is The Opinion Of Many.

Many local men have been calling attention to the fact that the railway excursions as they used to be in pre-war times. In former days large numbers of Queen's students and city people took advantage of the excursions to Toronto and Montreal. The railways benefited by them, the patrons had a chance to take a somewhat cheaper trip than ordinarily, and the teams from Kingston had encouragement and support when playing on strange fields.

Golf Record Equalled By Lad of Sixteen Years

Maurice H. Ashton, the sixteen-year-old son of the greenkeeper of the Walton Heath, England, course, recently accomplished a wonderful performance by winning the cup competition at North Foreland with a net return of \$2. By going out in 28 he equalled the figures put up by Abe Mitchell, and George Duncan when they established the professional record of 73 for the famous course. At the fourth hole, of 480 yards, Ashton was almost on the green with two wooden club shot, and he holed a six-yard put for a 4. His card for the outward journey was 4, 4, 5, 4, 3, 4, 4, 5, 5—38.

M.A.A.A. Works in Secret.

Secret practices last evening and tonight will conclude the training preparations of the M.A.A.A. football squad for the opening match against Ottawa, which is scheduled for the Westmount gridiron on Saturday afternoon. Signal practices will feature the workouts from now till the opening.

Wednesday the first team worked against the Juniors, Sharpe and Rowlands being the absentees. Sharpe watched the training from the side lines, it being decided that he should not risk his wrenched shoulder for a day or so yet. Phillips and Jacques alternated on the backfield in his place. The team will rest up on Friday for Saturday's game.

147,000 Fans at Polo Grounds.
A total of 141,000 persons—a new attendance record for four consecutive baseball games—passed through the turnstiles to see the New York-Cleveland series just finished at the Polo grounds, New York. The figures made public by Ed. Barrow, business manager of the Killies, did not include 1,500 "deadheads" per day, so that the number of persons who actually saw the game was 147,000. The best world's series attendance record was in 1912, when 136,996 fans witnessed the first four games between the New York Giants and the Boston Red Sox.

With Ottawas.
While the Ottawa team has not yet been selected it is likely that when they line up against the M.A.A.A. next Saturday, Walter Gilhooly, Joe Smith and Joe Tubman will be on the half line. Ellis Thomas is slated for quarter and either Jess Ketchum or Dave McKell will hold down the snap back position. Dewhurst and Gill will be the inside wings, with Humphreys and Baker the middies, and Pinhey and Bud Thomas the outsiders. In addition the Ottawas have a wealth of other good material and will have about eighteen players in uniform here.

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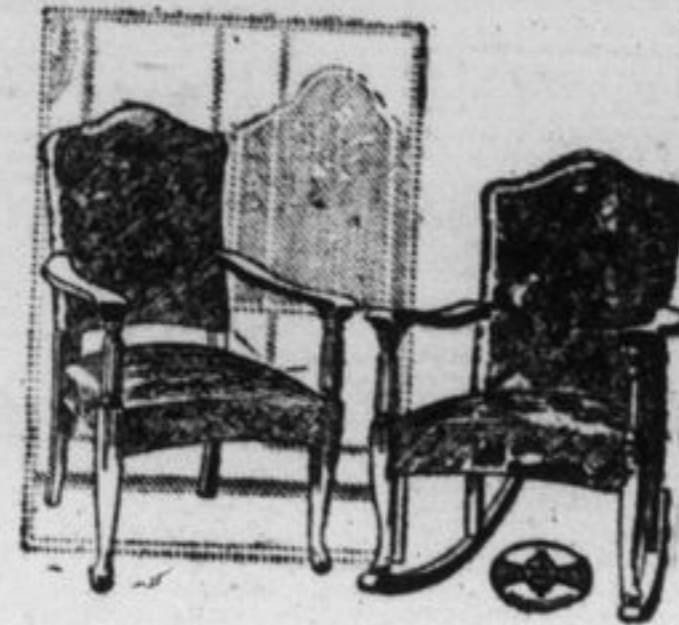
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
