

A determined public officer should have no difficulty in getting all the information requisite to bringing the principal offenders to the bar of justice.

It is not to be expected that the sending of a dozen or a hundred violators of the prohibition law to prison will put a stop to illegal practices. But it unquestionably would make the business so risky that the numbers engaging in it would be appreciably reduced and the traffic would be minimized. Making liquor harder to get will not, of course, improve the morals of any people, but it will prove a check on vicious practices, of which the Arbuckle party was a glaring example.
