The New York Giants have won ve pennants in the National League including and since 1905, but they have been victorious in only one world's series play. In 1911, the Giants again met the Athletics in the series and were defeated. They won the opening game, played on their home lot, by a score of 2 to 1, and lost the second, played at Philadelphia, by 3 to 1. The third game went 11 innings and was won by the Athletics 3 to 2. - The Athletics won the fourth, 4 to 2, but New York made a great effort and won the fifth, at 10 innings by 4 to 3. 
