tures of the whole squad is its weight. The whole fifty odd men, with but three or four exceptions, are big heavy fellows. Two or three freshmen have drifted in within the past few days who remind us of "Tiny" Bowman, and the beauty of them is that they are active mountains.

RUTH SEEKS TO HIT OUT SIXTY HOME RUNS

Bambino Clouted Horsehide for .727 Average in Series With Cleveland.

With a total of fifty-eight home runs this year, Babe Ruth of the New York Yankees is pointing toward a mark of sixty which he hopes to attain before the season closes. He has five games in which to reach the three score figure.

Ruth walloped the ball for two circuit clouts in the game against Cleveland yesterday. A two-bagger gave him a perfect batting average. He also hit two homers in one day last year off Pitcher Rommel of the Philadelphia Athletics on Sept. 27th.

In the four games just finished against Cleveland, the president of the home run club averaged 727 with the bat, making eight hits for a total of 18 bases.

To Control All Sports.

A meeting of the Peterboro Amateur Athletic Association was held and plans discussed for the formation of junior and intermediate O. H. A. hockey teams. The association will also further the interests of the collegiate rugby team, which is planning a series of games. Commencing with the hockey season the Peterboro Amateur Athletic Association gives promise of becoming a very active organization in the development of local sport. Under its head an attempt will be made to consolidate all local sporting interests and develop it along amateur lines. Private individuals, who seek to control hockey, baseball and other sporting organizations will be invited to direct their activities along other lines. Their interest in sport has been a hindrance and the Peterboro Athletic Association will do some house cleaning along these lines.

Keep Daylight Saving To Encourage Athletics

Although clocks throughout the state were turned back to standard time Sunday, Williams College, Williamstown, Mass., has decided to retain daylight saving for another month in order that the student body may benefit by additional opportunity to engage in sports. The arrangement is one of the steps taken in connection with the recently adopted policy to encourage a more general participation in athletics by the undergraduates, who are now turning to football, baseball, tennis, golf and track.

GIANTS ONLY ONCE VICTORS

In the World's Baseball Series —That Was Back in 1905.

The New York Giants have won five pennants in the National League including and since 1905, but they have been victorious in only one world's series play. McGraw won the world's title with his team in 1905 against the Philadelphia Athletics, and though he has had greater organizations since, the American League champions overcame them.

The series of 1905 consisted of five shutout games, of which the Giants won four. Christy Mathewson turned in three of the victories. Only 91,723 persons saw all five of the games and the total gate receipts were a mite over \$68,000, but it was a series that will stand as one of the greatest in baseball world series history.

New York won the first game 3 to 0 and was turned back by the same score in the second contest. They won the third, 9 to 0, the fourth 1 to 0 and the fifth 2 to 0.

In 1911, the Giants again met the Athletics in the series and were defeated. They won the opening game, played on their home lot, by a score of 2 to 1, and lost the second, played at Philadelphia, by 3 to 1. The third game went 11 innings and was won by the Athletics 3 to 2. The Athletics made a great effort and won the fifth, at 10 innings by 4 to 3. The Athletics pounded out enough hits to make 13 runs in the deciding game and New York tallied but twice.

Many believed the Giants should have won from the Boston Red Sox in 1912, but the luck favored the Bostonians and they were acclaimed world's champions after eight games had been played, one a tie in 11 innings. Boston won the opener, 4 to 3, and the second was a 6-6 tie. New York won the third 2 to 1. Boston won the next two, 3 to 1 and 2 to 1, respectively. New York won the sixth and seventh, 5-2 and 11-4. The result of the 8th game already has been mentioned.

For the third time the Giants were pitted against the Athletics in a world's championship in the games of 1913 and New York took but one game of the five. They won the second game 3 to 0 in 10 innings. The Athletics won the first, 6 to 4; the third, 8 to 2; the fourth, 6 to 5 and the fifth, 3 to 1.

The Giants met the Chicago White Sox in the series of 1917, and after losing the first two games, 2 to 1 and 7 to 2, won the third and fourth by shutouts, 2 to 0 and 5 to 0. The White Sox won the fifth and the sixth, 8 to 5 and 4 to 2.

Have Been Set Aside.

The New York Jockey Club today revoked the licenses of Buddy Ensor, one of the most prominent riders on the eastern turf; Arthur Collins and G. Yeargin, Collins has been riding at Latonia during the present season, while Yeargin has appeared on Canadian tracks. No reason for the action was announced.

The reason of Ensor being ruled off is well known. He is said to be a devotee of one John Barleycorn, who holds all records. Ensor was the greatest jockey of his day, but misused the powers bestowed on him. Why Yeargin is ruled off is harder to fathom. He looked a great little bit of stuff, but evidently has been going wide.

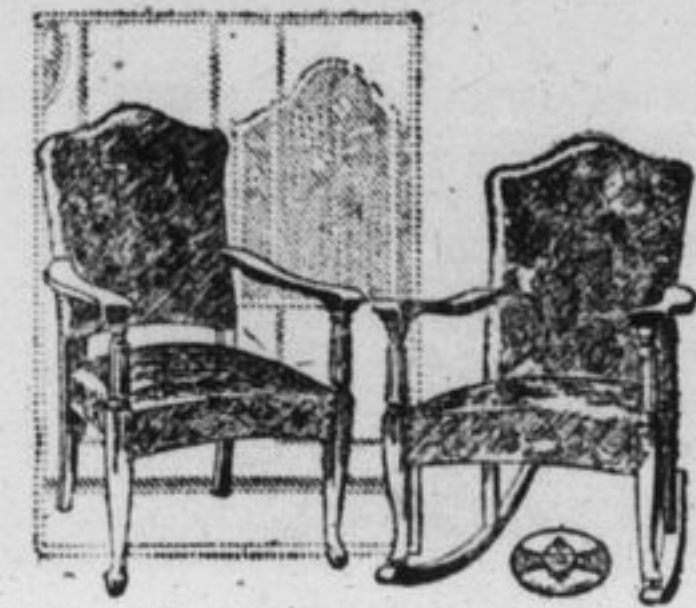

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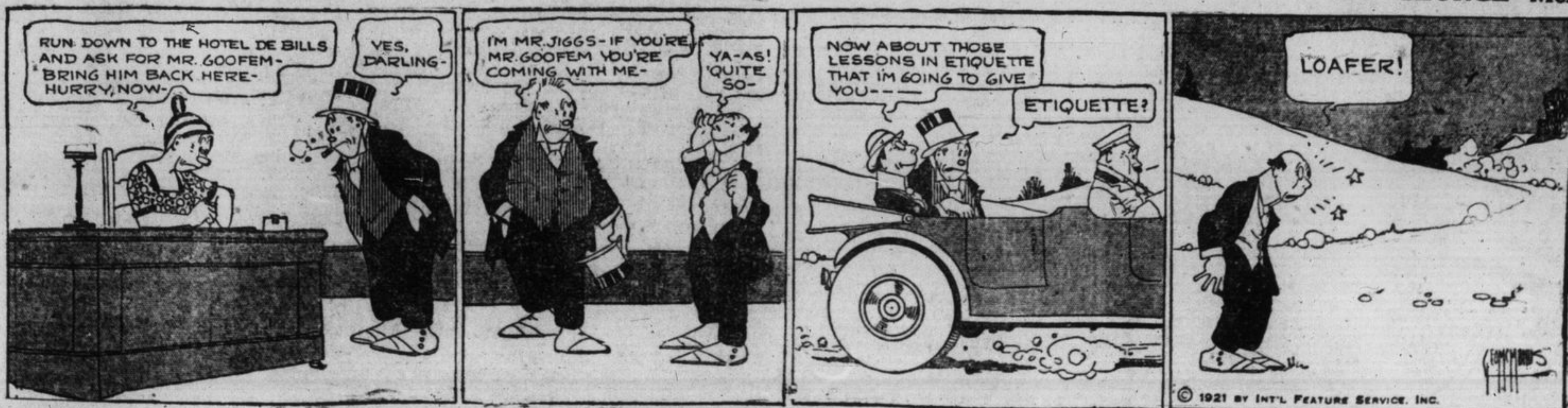
