Late Notes From Selby.

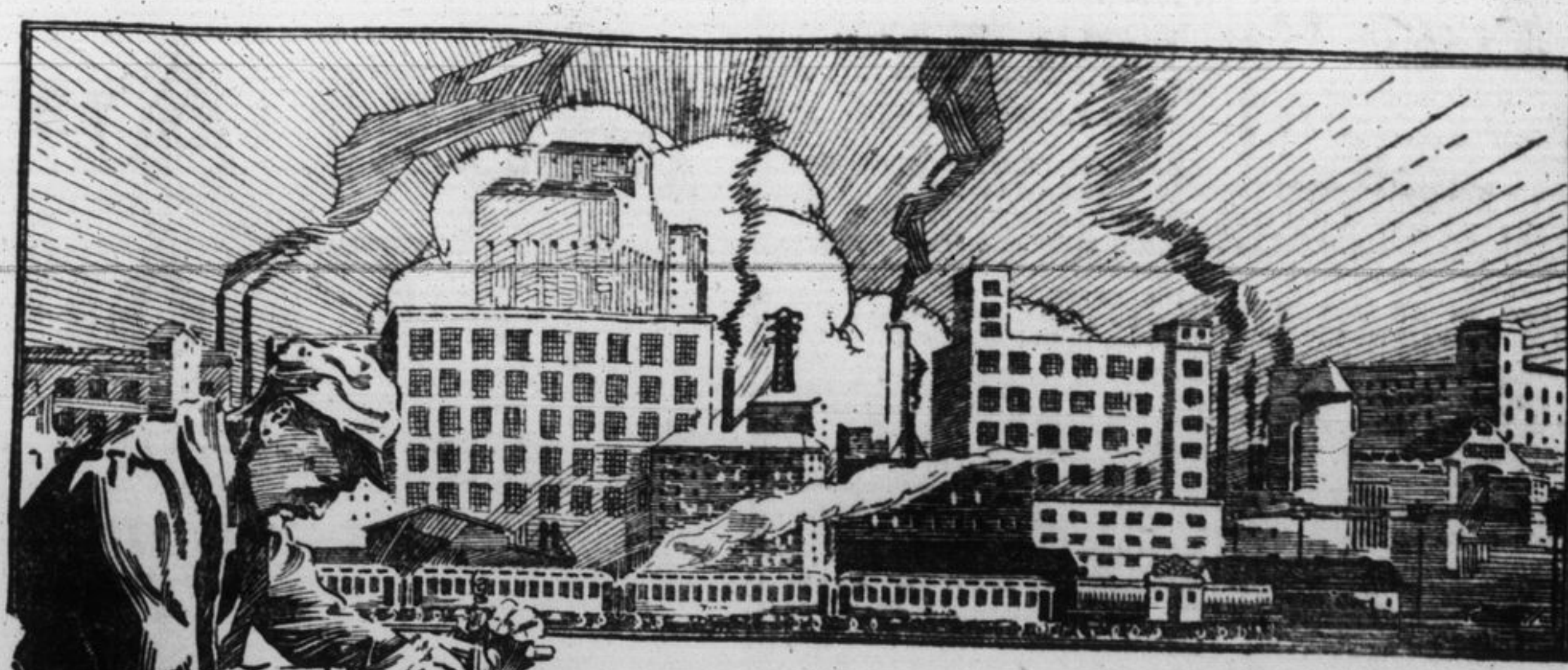

England's Death Rate.

The Registrar-General of England and Wales publishes figures that show a great reduction in the death rate and a substantial increase in the birth rate. The general death rate is now only 12.4 to 1,000; the infant mortality is 80 to 1,000 births, while in 1916 it was 97, from 1901 to 1910 it was 28 and from 1891 to 1900, 153. The general birth rate is now 24.4 to 1,000 of the total population; in London it is 26.2; in a hundred large towns, 26.3, and in 150 smaller towns, 24.9. These are the highest birth rate figures for a decade.

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
