In the first brush the Canadian entry led until he last fifty yards when Single G., by a magnificent spurt, dashed under the wire, winner by a length. The time was 2.05. The second heat lacked a thrill for the American horse led all the way and jogged to the finish in 2.18, after Romola went off the track at the quarter mile turn when he went wide in an attempt to head off his rival.
Although Single G. had won, his owner consented to a third heat, the American racer won easily. No time was announced.

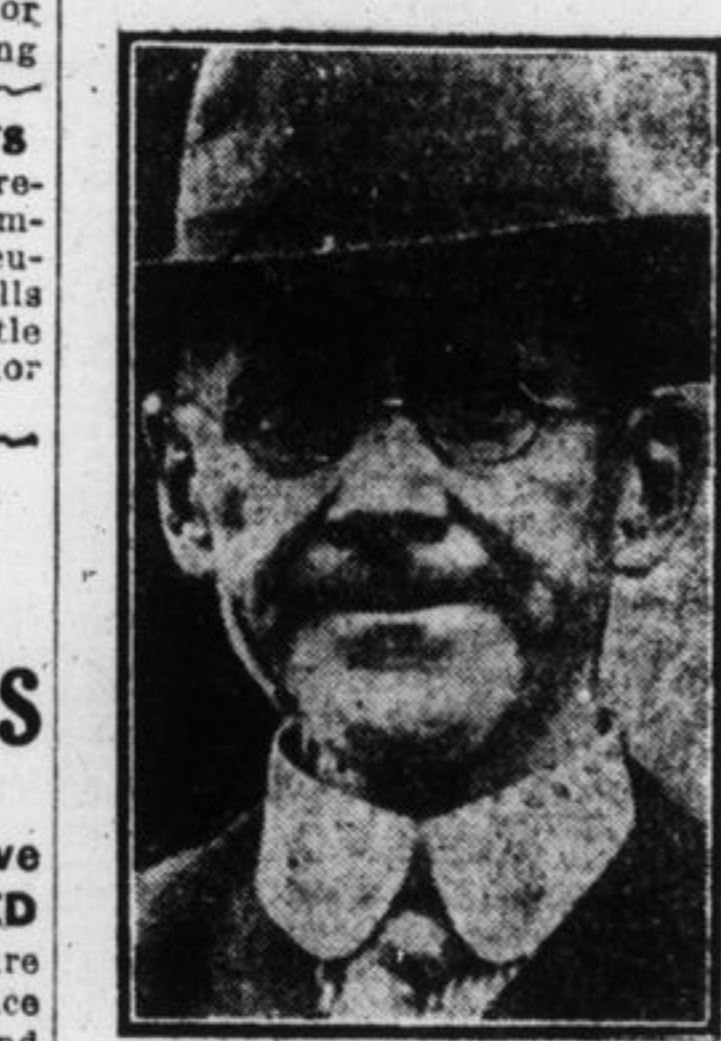
