MR, MACKENZIE KING. The leader of the Liberal party in Canada comes of distinguished demo-Attached is one of the best job cratic lineage. His mother was a daughter of the famous rebel leader of 1837; and as time goes on, whatever may be thought of the method adopted, there is general agreement that William Lyon Mackenzie made a great patriotic contribution to representative government in Canada. The intolerable conditions imposed by a small group of special interests in those days will always remain as one of the most outrageous public scandals in the history of this country. Mr. King falls heir to this honorable protest against special interests for privileged classes, and this

is the fundamental principle upon which Liberalism is founded. His scholarship is adequate, he has given some years to honest research in social questions, and has published book of more than ordinary merit on the Social Service problem. He was pet of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier who had a peculiar fondness for him, and who promoted him more rapidly than his age or political achievements warranted; but in his handling of the Chinese question in Vancouver and in the gentleman's agreement made with Japan regarding immigration, Mr. King seems to have
