## SOME PEOPLE KINGSTON CAN WELL DO WITHOUT

Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson Tells the Kiwanis Club About Them.

"Some people that Kingston can do without," was the title of an address given by Rev. Dr. R. J. Wilson before the Kiwanis Club at the weekly luncheon in the Hotel Frontenac on Monday. In order to divide the sheep from the goats, he distinguished the desirable class as of the dynamic type and the undesirable class as the static type. While nobody could guess who fell within the undesirable class all knew after the introduction of George VanHorn, the silent booster, that this enterprising man's furnisher was of the dynamic class and therefore one of the most desirable. George is agent for Serl-Ready clothing and sells high-class furnishings. He came to Kingston from Port Hope many years ago and his standing in business, in sport and in the fraternal orders, of which he is an ornament, is due to his integrity. George had some pleasant surprises for the lucky winners in the form of prizes, articles of men's wear, that were samples of excellence. The winners were R. E. Burns, R. Robinson, M. J. Johnston, Ambrose Shea, R. J. Rodger.

The roll call discovered some delinquents in the persons of Kiwanians A. B. Cunningham who was late, W. H. Craig and H. E. Richardson. The guests were Cecil Smith, Rev. J. de P. Wright and J. C. Broom. Harold Hughes, while leaving the city at 2 p.m., took time to attend the luncheon and lead the singing in his usual fine style.

Kiwanian Wilson is a great asset to any club, but he showed during his address that he was also an asset to Kingston and was determined to find out all of her other assets, but he held out little hope of salvation for the sort that Kingston can do without. Indeed it would not be worth anybody's while to spend valuable time trying to create something from nothing. There are types that are a positive detriment to any town. The bandits, for instance, the man who beats a railway by rebates, bootleggers, etc. But the eternal knocker, no one likes to meet. We do meet them and right among those who claim citizenship from birth. There is another person who thinks Kingston but a wayside spot of the railway, and the man who comes to live here only long enough to make his pile and pull out, and the man who knows it all. All of these men are of the aesthetic type represented by the clam that at some distant period in the world's history attained its development and set to work to build about itself a wall of bone. A clam it has remained ever since. On the other hand is the dynamic type represented by the man who comes here to live as if he was always here and put his whole energy into everything associated with the well-being of his community. But of all who should be given their ticket are the parasites, bandits, pilferers and loafers whether they are found in the professions or trades or in business.

But the speaker had something to offer to his hearers that has been found productive in other places. One of his suggestions was to follow the example of Chicago, a city with a population of 3,000,000, which adopted the slogan "Throw away your Hammer and buy a Horn." This was posted everywhere, and if a city of 3,000,000 found use for such a slogan, what might Kingston not expect? Advertising was what we wanted and there was no place for the merchant who would not advertise. This was admirably put forward at the annual convention of the Advertisers' Association of America held in London last week.

What Dr. Wilson endeavored to impress upon his hearers was the supreme importance of becoming converted to an attitude of life that was dynamic rather than aesthetic. Prosperity will come, said he, when we substitute industry for indolence, pull the cart rather than try to get into it—in a word there must be the spirit of service. We want to see more wholesome competition, not cut-throat competition, but a competition of the kind that will spur a business man on to secure prosperity if he has to sit up all night to do it. But we must have some business and some social ethics for he believed that behind all business depression today, behind the great crime wave, there are great fundamental questions to be solved and we are not going to get anywhere until we solve them satisfactorily.

In concluding, Kiwanian Wilson said: "I want this town to be the best town on the map and I don't intend to apologize for it anywhere on God's green earth." Hearty applause followed the conclusion of Dr. Wilson's address, and President Frank Hoag tendered to him a very warm vote of thanks.

A letter was read by the secretary, George Brownlee, from Major-Gen. Sir A. C. Macdonell explaining his absence from the luncheon which was due to a painful accident on Friday. A resolution of sympathy, moved by Dr. Wilson, and seconded by H. W. Newman, was passed. A sick committee composed of the following members was appointed: A. W. Winton, H. E. Richardson and Columbus Hanley.

James Armstrong, chief of the fire department, directed the attention of the meeting to the fact that next week, beginning Sunday, would be fire prevention week all over Canada, and he asked the co-operation of all business men in having a thorough clean up of cellars, closets and attics carried out. Kingston, he said,

suffered heavier losses from fire during the past year than for several years previously.

President Hoag thanked the members for turning out with their automobiles to attend the decoration of soldiers' graves on Sunday with the veterans from the hospitals.

### "PEN" BEING FILLED UP; NOW 805 CONVICTS

Largest Number Confined There in the Last Fifty Years.

It was learned on Tuesday morning that there are at the present time 805 convicts confined in the Portsmouth penitentiary, the largest number there at any one time in the last fifty years.

The large number of prisoners tells the story of the crime wave which has been sweeping over Canada the past few years.

As a result of the epidemic of highway robberies and hold-ups, the judges have been sending more offenders to the penitentiary than to the jails.

Canon Scott Lectures at R.M.C. Canon Scott, Quebec, late senior chaplain of the First Canadian Division in France, gave his lecture, "Some Battles I Have Seen," before a class of cadets at the Royal Military College on Monday evening. This lecture is said to have been very popular in Quebec. Canon Scott's only son was killed during the war. The canon was the guest of Major-Gen. Macdonell while at the college. He left on the noon train Tuesday for Toronto.
