COUNTY COURT, SESSIONS

Several of the Cases on the List Were Held Over and Three Others Adjourned.

Judge Madden presided at the non-jury sittings of the county court of Frontenac, which opened on Tuesday afternoon. Nine cases were on the original list. Two cases, in which damages were asked from the Civic Utilities Commission and the city of Kingston were laid over for another court, one was enlarged till the fall assizes, three were enlarged till October 20th and three others were proceeded with.

The case of the township of Kingston vs. Robert E. Harpell, of Cataraugus, was the first case taken up. Plaintiff made claim for \$277.23 for taxes for 1920. Judgment was given for the plaintiff. J. L. Whiting, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff and W. F. Nickle, K.C., for the defendant.

The following cases were enlarged till October 20th:

Douglas Emmons vs. Thomas Nicholson, a claim for damages for breach of contract.

Margaret Huycke vs. William McInnam, a suit to receive possession of a piano.

Arthur Waitman vs. J. C. Le Feuvre, a claim for \$516.79 for goods.

The case of A. Spierman vs. Max Levison, a claim for damages for failure to deliver a carload of boiler plate, was enlarged till the fall assizes.

The two cases against the city which have been withdrawn from this court are:

Charlotte Ormston vs. Kingston Public Utilities, a claim for damages for injury.

William Perry and Edith Perry vs. the City of Kingston, a claim for \$500 for injuries received in a fall.

FISHING BOAT IS NEARLY SWAMPED

Alexandria Bay Man Has Close Call During Storm at Delta on Friday.

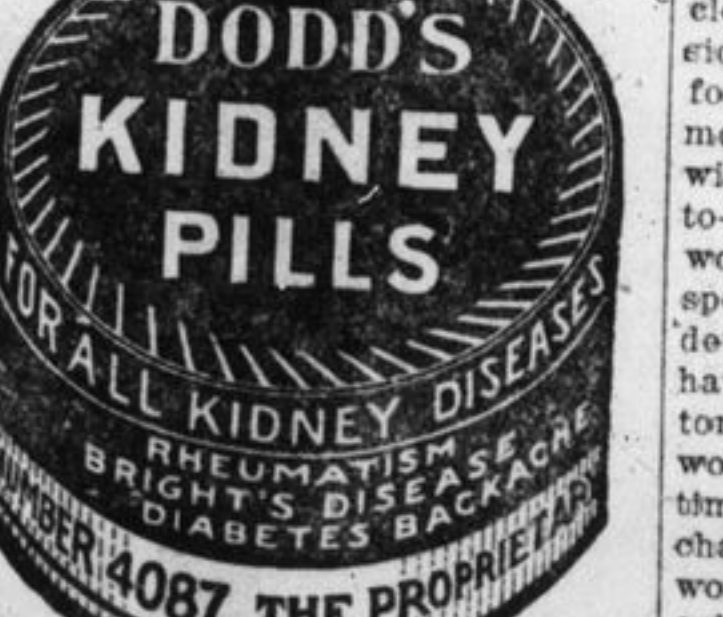
Charles H. Bailey, general merchant at Alexandria Bay, N.Y., returned from Delta Lake, Ont., last Saturday after spending a week fishing. Mr. Bailey and his guide had a very narrow escape last Friday during the gale that struck the north country, and he is lucky to be able to tell about it.

He and his guide were out a considerable distance from shore in their boat, fishing, when the storm came upon them so quickly that they hardly knew what to do. Within a few minutes their boat was nearly full of water. The guide said that to save themselves would be to slide over the side of the boat and hold fast until they could drift ashore. Mr. Bailey, however, said that he was a good bailer and he and the guide started to bail and succeeded in keeping the boat afloat.

They arrived back at camp in a very exhausted condition and consider themselves lucky that it was not worse. Mr. Bailey brought home with him some fine specimens of black and Oswego bass and wall-eyed pike.

Sex Predetermination. New York, Oct. 5.—Predetermination of sex, goal of many scientific experiments with birds and fowls, is being attempted with mammals for the first time at the Carnegie Insti-
