It was founded and endowed by the American millionaire, Mr. de Coppet, and spent many years in Plozalezey, a retired Swiss valley, gaining the perfect ensemble which has made it famous. Kingstonians are indeed fortunate to have the opportunity of hearing such famous artists and owe their support to the university.
