CARRIED BODY OF DEAD

CHILD FOR MANY MILES The story of a woman walking for miles through terrible mud to lay the body of a dead child of a settler into a grave dug with her own hands, was told during a session of the Women's Institutes of the North, at North Bay. The heroine of the narrative was Mrs. A. H. Willet, Cochrane, who was interrupted during her recital of the need of help among the northern settlers by a sister delegate to the convention who told the audience of the work which Mrs. Willet has carried on for years, practically without recompense, aiding the familles of settlers in the Cochrane neighbor-

Over seventy women delegates from all parts of the North attended the convention which was the first one held in this district. It was decided to organize a branch in North Bay.
