Ontario Municipal Board Hears Complaints of City and County.

A DEPUTY ACCUSED OF TAKING BRIBES

Charged With Accepting 100,000 Francs for Anti-French Activities.

Paris, Oct. 25.—The evening journal, Liberté, recently published a sort of open letter addressed to M. André Berthon, a deputy belonging to the Communist party, accusing him of having received the sum of 100,000 francs from a number of Syrians who were expelled from Syria because of their anti-French activities and at present interned at Corsica.

THE REPLIES DON'T TALLY

Liberal Leader Speaks About Ministers' Explanations of Munition Shipments.

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King demanded last night in a public meeting at Rockland, Ont., why Premier Meighen, Hon. Hugh Guthrie, minister of militia, and Major-General MacBrien gave mutually contradictory explanations of the reason for the five shipments of high explosives which have come to Canada since the premier and the minister of militia attended the conference of premiers of the Empire in London.

RAID MIDDLESEX JAIL IN SEARCH FOR LIQUOR

Mrs. Stillman Wants To Be Sons' Guardian

New York, Oct. 26.—Citations directing James A. Stillman, divorcee, to show cause next Friday why Mrs. Stillman should not be appointed general guardian of their sons, James and Alexander, were issued yesterday by Surrogate Cohan. They were procured by Mrs. Stillman's counsel.

CHANCES OF SUCCESS REPORTED IMPROVED

ONTARIO ITINERARY FOR HON. MR. KING

Several Changes in Time and Place From Previous Announcements.

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—The complete itinerary for the Ontario tour of Hon. Mackenzie King, issued here, makes some changes in time and place from announcements previously made. The revised schedule of meetings follows:

WHY PRISONS ARE CROWDED

Ticket-of-Leave Act Operation Has Been Partially Suspended.

The population of the Portsmouth penitentiary has reached the highest point in more than forty years, the number confined being over 820. It is stated that this is due to some extent to the suspension of the operations of the Ticket-of-Leave Act, passed in 1899 and which was a great reformative force, and also an effective means by which to keep down the annual expenditure for maintenance. It enabled the authorities to liberate or parole young first offenders who served their sentences at large while following some useful occupation.

Lieut.-Col. the Hon. Frederick Nicholls, Senator, and President of Canada General Electric, who died on Tuesday.

RAILWAY CASUALTIES.

One Passenger Was Killed Out of Each 1,452,000.

Ottawa, Oct. 26.—One passenger was killed on Canadian steam railways during the year 1919 to every 1,452,000 carried; and there was one injured to every 128,772 carried. There was a slight increase in the casualties over the previous year, the number being 35 killed and 372 injured as against 32 and 422 respectively. During the year 1919 there were 162 employees killed and 1,994 injured as against 32 and 322 respectively, other accidents, 35 employees, 1 passenger and 5 others were killed, whilst 4,458 employees, 20 passengers and 27 others were injured.

URGES EARLY CLOSING OF PUBS.

London, Oct. 26.—The Archbishop of Canterbury has issued a letter regarding the licensing of public houses by justices in the area of Poplar and Stepney, urging early closing of licensed houses. He says: "For those who are weakened or weak-hearted the last hour of the open public house is fraught with more peril than all the other hours put together."

TO MAKE A SEARCH.

Copenhagen, Oct. 26.—The Danish government in April appropriated 200,000 kroner to defray the expense of sending the ship, Teddy, to the east coast of Greenland to search for the East Greenland Trading Company's ship Dagny which had been dispatched from Copenhagen in the spring of 1920. Since then, nothing has been heard of her.

RECORD IN GRAIN SHIPMENTS.

Winnipeg, Oct. 26.—A record in grain shipments, the best since 1915, was established when the Canadian Pacific Railway moved east from Winnipeg to Fort William 1,443 cars of grain. This constitutes the greatest movement of grain on any Canadian railway in one day since 1915, when the same company moved over the same territory 1,493 cars on Oct. 29th.

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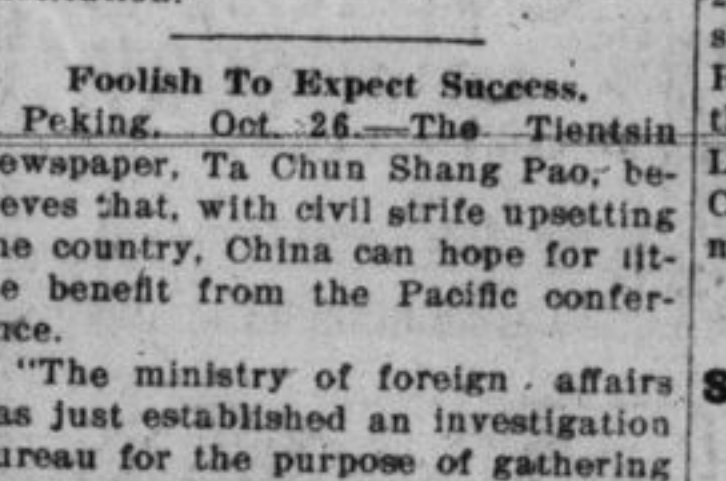
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
